

Lens of scripture is lens of love

During my sabbatical summer in 2013, I visited a lot of churches and I heard a lot of sermons. The most memorable sermon I heard was preached by Fisher Humphries, retired professor at Beeson Divinity School at Samford University. Dr. Humphries was the guest preacher at The Baptist Church of the Covenant in Birmingham, Alabama, the day I visited. On that Sunday morning Dr. Humphries began preaching about economics and politics and within about five or six minutes I began to wonder how he was going to untangle himself from a line of argumentation I perceived was headed in a very controversial direction. But no sooner did I think he was taking the side of full-blown Scandinavian socialism, he made a turn and began defending a vision of capitalism that would make the Chamber of Commerce proud. In defending the socialists' impetus, he discussed the Christian responsibility to care for the widow, the orphan, the poor, and the weak. He talked about the communal sharing of Jesus and his disciples, and he made note of Jesus' contempt for the rich and the powerful. When Dr. Humphries switched gears and began arguing for a capitalist position, he talked about the freedom of Christ, and he argued that above all things Christianity breaks the bonds of Caesar and undermines the power of the state—which is a necessity for socialist economies.

I really enjoyed Dr. Humphries' sermon

because he didn't go where I thought he was going to go. He made strong and nuanced theological arguments for two seemingly contrary positions and showed how a simplistic reading of scripture without thoughtful theological reflection is often misleading, if not dangerous.

Ultimately, the thesis of his sermon was that our loyalty to God must inform our political and economic positions and that moral and ethical positions are often ambiguous, especially when filtered through the lens of scripture.

Dr. Humphries argued that there are times when Christian theology is in tension with itself, which is why Christians can hold seemingly opposite positions with integrity. As an Episcopal priest, I strive to create

As an Episcopal priest, I strive to create an atmosphere in our church where we can hold contrary positions with integrity. There are times when it can be frustrating to argue with the same curmudgeon or to step in the middle of an uninformed diatribe. Yet, the messy business of community is worth it—at least for me. Jesus calls us to love God and to love our neighbors as ourselves even when the neighbor voted for the wrong candidate or came down on the opposite side of your pet issue. The church is a school of discipleship where our first loyalty is to the God of love, and where we can learn to love one another. We will not always get it right, but we will not get it at all if we do not make an effort to learn.

Stewardship Campaign Begins

Next Sunday marks the beginning of our stewardship initiative for 2020, the pledge drive that provides most of the funding for St. Luke's operations – from salaries for staff to dishwashing detergent for the kitchen.

Our continuing stewardship theme – *The St. Luke's Way* – captures the forward-looking, Christ-driven attitude that has made St. Luke's such a meaningful part of our lives and the life of our community. Next week you'll receive a flyer summarizing what's involved in the budget for 2020 and how your generosity underpins the many good works of St. Luke's. Please take the time to read this brief flyer.

The Vestry has recommended an expense budget for 2020 that is just slightly over this year's spending needs. Even though some expenses beyond our control (such as property insurance) are expected to rise again next year, we've been able to hold down other costs, especially in the area of staff expenses.

However, because of some faithful members have moved out of town this year, the number of families pledging to support the church has declined somewhat. The stewardship flyer will explain how this shortfall can be made up if we all participate.

We should constantly remind ourselves that St. Luke's only exists because of the regular, predictable support from our congregational family. Over the next few weeks, you'll be hearing more about next year's financial plan at the Sunday services. And, of course, Vestry members are always available to answer your questions. As usual, we will need volunteers in each of these main areas: 1) prepare and share a meal with families; 2) spend two hours in the evening after dinner with the families and

plan games/activities with the kids; 3) bring your sleeping bag, pillow and sleep overnight at the church; 4) supply donations - bring supplies and groceries for families to use throughout the week at Anchor House.

St. Luke's Fall Music and Godly Play Schedule




After being deposited in the church account, the proceeds of the sale will be transferred to the Vanguard Investment account.
