All: In-person worship has been suspended by Bishop Ed until further notice; and he has indicated in a message to the clergy on March 21 that this suspension will extend beyond Easter. Since it will be awhile before we can meet again in person, St. Luke's will begin offering worship online beginning this Sunday at 10 AM. I also want to pass along some other things that are happening, so please read through this whole message. Links to all the things we are doing digitally will be finalized and available on our parish website by Saturday. If you get confused or cannot find something, please use the parish website as a starting point ([episcopalbartlesville.org](http://episcopalbartlesville.org)).

1. I will be leading Morning Prayer this Sunday morning at 10 AM on the Zoom meeting app. Zoom can be accessed on a computer or a Smart phone. There will be links to the service on the parish website and the St. Luke's Facebook page. I encourage you to look at the Zoom app in advance if you plan to attend the worship service. If we can get it to work on Facebook or YouTube live, the service will be offered there too. Again, links will be up on the webpage and Facebook.
2. The order of service has been sent to you in a packet you should have received this week. The readings for each Sunday through Easter were sent as well. The readings for future Sundays and Holy Week will be printed in *The Steeple*.
3. Audio version of the Sunday sermons will be available on the parish website. Video versions of the sermon will be available on Youtube at the St. Luke's YouTube site at <https://bit.ly/2QIgY7c>. Last Sunday's sermon is available now.  
For people that do not like Facebook, I've created an Instagram page. It will be used to post pictures and prayers and other encouraging items. You can find St. Luke's by searching on Instagram for episcopalbartlesville. Online giving will be available soon using an app called Tightly. More information will be available later this week.
4. Bishop Ed tested negative for coronavirus. He had been exposed but he is doing well.
5. The consecration for Bishop-elect Reed is rescheduled for Saturday, May 30. It will be held at a small venue and attendance will be minimized. It will be lived streamed and a public celebration will be held when we can do one safely.
6. If you need anything picked up and delivered to your home, please let the office know. We have a few volunteers willing to help our members that aren't leaving their homes.

Thanks for your patience over the past week. Trying to figure out how to serve the church remotely has been a challenge. The parish leaders and I are trying to make decisions that are prudent as well as sustainable. Additionally, a lot of what we are doing, we haven't done before, so please give us a chance to figure it out. We want your feedback and suggestions, but please remember that all of this is a work in progress.

## A-B-C-D-E-F-G

Can you remember the tune that goes with these letters? Sure you do. You learned it in first grade. The tune is the “Alphabet Song.” The amazing thing is that even after more than sixty years the song is still used. Anything you need to find can be assisted by singing (under your breath) that little tune. For a short period of time I had a filing land abstracts-the tune was essential. Organizing legal papers in Iowa City, Iowa required the alphabet song over and over. Sometimes I would hear a colleague singing A-B-C-D in the next aisle. We would smile at each other on the way out of the Records Room. The song is just sooo familiar.

There are other songs, rhymes and selections that get into our minds, our hearts, our bones, and pop up in times of joy, boredom or stress.

I find songs used in advertising irritating, especially the new one for Alfa Romero automobiles. Using the opening bars to Beethoven’s *Ode to Joy* is just wrong, even if the words fit *their* idea for good retailing. *Joyful, joyful, we adore thee*, for a car?? Like I said, irritating. Often advertising music is meant to be catching, meant for us to sing in our heads, so we will buy with our pocketbooks.

*Now I lay me down to sleep. I pray the Lord my soul to keep.* I prayed those words as a child, perhaps you did also. Did we understand at that tender age what a soul was? Not likely, but those words, they are ingrained.

*Our Father who art in heaven.* Now there is a set of words that gets into our souls. I have sat at the side of a dying person, lying in a coma, and when friends and family begin that prayer together, their lips move in sync.

Are people today aware that what we say, what we sing, what we think is part of who we are? That our minds follow what we allow within our thoughts? Where we go imprints on our bodies? Keeping our hearts and minds filled with good stuff is not easy. Much of our language is used to entice us to act and think in ways advantageous to the desires of other parties.

As a Christian I find it helpful to keep my ideas fixed on the good, the kind, the joyful. So, sing *The Ode to Joy* using the words. *Joyful, joyful, we adore thee, God of Glory, Lord of Love; hearts unfold like flowers before thee, praising thee, their sun above. Look the rest of the words in our hymnal #376.*

Now if I could just get that tune out of my head. (A-B-C-D-E-F-G)

### Pope Francis Invites Christians to Pray on March 25th

Pope Francis on Sunday invited all Christians to respond to the coronavirus pandemic "with the universality of prayer, of compassion, of tenderness", adding, "Let us remain united. Let us make our closeness felt toward those persons who are the most lonely and tried". Speaking after the traditional recitation of the Angelus, the Holy Father called on all Christians to join together in prayer. "In these trying days, while humanity trembles due to the thread of the pandemic, I would like to propose to all Christians that together we lift our voices towards Heaven," he said.

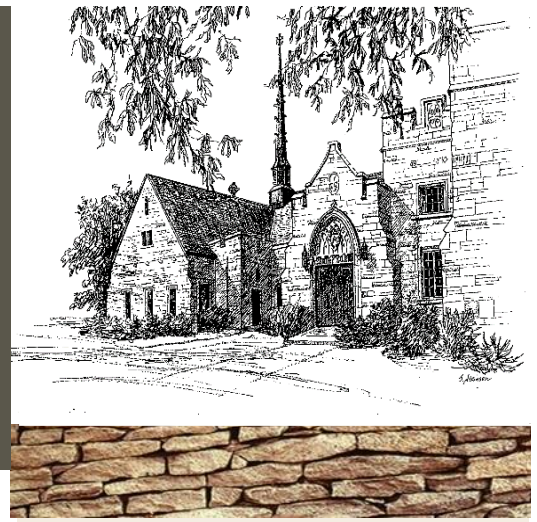
It would be great if you could go through these lessons with your children the next few Sundays. If they attended Sunday School the first three weeks of Lent, a few of the lessons may be review.
