December Already

December is shaping up to a fairly busy month for St. Luke's despite the social restrictions posed by the pandemic. As far as Sunday services are concerned, the worship team is planning to continue in-person as well virtual services, but we're keeping a close eye on the local situation. The diocese is leaving it up to individual churches to make their own decisions regarding in-person worship, based on conditions within their own congregations and in their geographic areas. Virtual broadcasts will continue regardless. With that in mind, here's what the December line-up of activities looks like...

Dec. 6 will be a Morning Prayer service led by members of the congregation. The homily will be provided by Dolores McCreary. If you're wondering about the topic, here is a hint that no doubt long-time members will catch: Think frog.

Dec. 7-8 will be the mailing dates for this year's Stewardship letter. As noted by Doug and me during the announcements at last Sunday's service, the focus this year is on the time+talent components of stewardship. Our expense budget will be unchanged from this year, and that will be explained in this brief mailer. Please note that your pledge card for 2021 will be enclosed along with a return envelope.

Dec. 13 will be Holy Communion Rite II with Fr. Noel Doherty, who's been a great help to us from the very beginning of our "rector-less" journey that started five months ago.

Dec. 20 will once again be Fr. Noel officiating and delivering the sermon at the Holy Communion Rite II service. Thank you, Fr. Noel, for sticking with us!

Dec. 21 will be the deadline for returning your pledge card. You can mail it back in the return envelope or drop it in the offering plate on Dec. 20 or at a previous service. Or you can leave it in the church's locked mail box on the left side of the north door.

Dec. 23 from 2 pm to 4 pm will be your personal opportunity to come take in the beauty of the St. Luke's nave, decorated for Christmas just hours before by the Altar Guild. This is something new that will be repeated again on the 24th. It will be a come-and-go time of reflection and anticipation for you and your family. A quiet selection for familiar sacred music will be provided by Dolores.

Dec. 24 from 10 am to 12 noon will be another opportunity for you and family members to prepare for Christmas Eve surrounded by the holiday beauty of St. Luke's.

Dec. 24 at 3:30 will be a special **Family Christmas Service** in which the youth of the church will participate. Officiating at this service will be another visiting clergyman familiar to us all – Fr. Mark Wood. Welcome back, Fr. Mark.

Dec. 27 will be a virtual service (time to be announced) from the St. Paul's Cathedral in Oklahoma City with the Bishop Poulson and other members of the diocesan staff participating. St. Luke's will not have a service on this Sunday. A link to the virtual service will be posted closer to the time of broadcast.

Meet Teresa Phares

Teresa Phares, wife of our new rector Fr. Nick and mother of three, holds an important relationship with the Godly Play program – the youth Sunday School curriculum that has been used and treasured by St. Luke’s for many years.

Not only have Teresa and Fr. Nick been regular Godly Play teachers at St. Christopher’s in Pensacola, but since 2016, Teresa has served as the US Training Operations Manager as well as Director of US Membership for the Godly Play Foundation. Here is more information about Teresa as posted on the Godly Play Foundation website:

Teresa was born and raised in Southwest Michigan and received her B.S. in Mathematics Education from Western Michigan University. During her eleven-year teaching career, she also obtained an M.A. in Curriculum and Instruction from Spring Arbor University. In 2014, Teresa’s family moved to Sewanee, TN, so that her husband could pursue his call to ordination and attend seminary. While living in Sewanee, Teresa also attended the School of Theology at the University of the South and received her M.A. in Theology in May 2017. Teresa and her family now live in Pensacola, FL, where her husband serves as Assistant Rector at St. Christopher’s Episcopal Church.

In addition to her roles on staff with the Foundation, Teresa also serves as a Godly Play Missioner in the Gulf Coast region and has been instrumental in starting and supporting several Godly Play programs in the area. For Teresa, being a Godly Play practitioner and storyteller is a spiritual practice that enriches her own faith story in countless ways. Her favorite part of sharing stories in a circle of children is witnessing how they develop the Christian language and internalize the stories in deep ways.

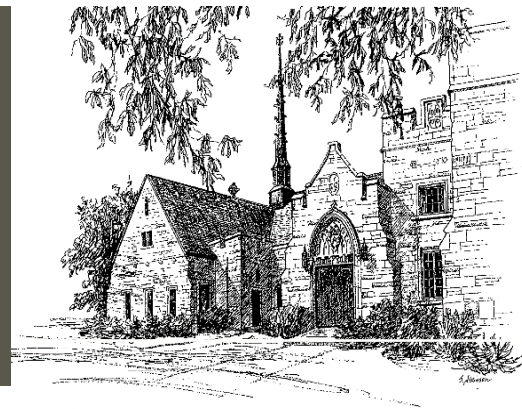
Online & Mobile Giving Available

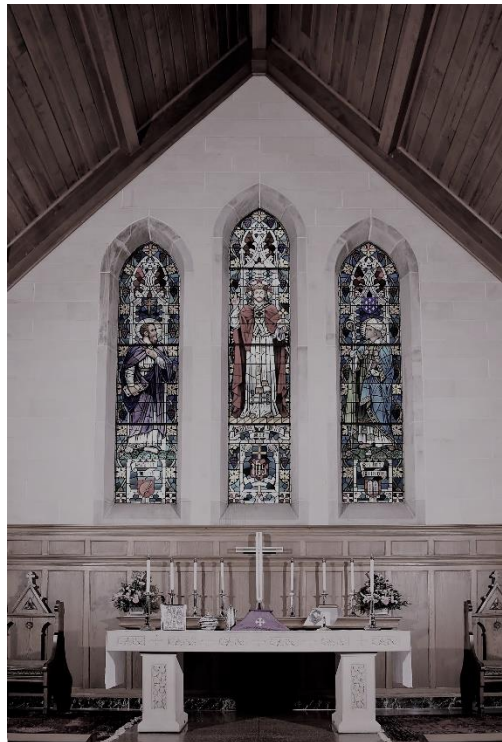

Second Lesson – 2 Peter 3:8-15a

Do not ignore this one fact, beloved, that with the Lord one day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like one day. The Lord is not slow about his promise, as some think of slowness, but is patient with you, not wanting any to perish, but all to come to repentance. But the day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then the heavens will pass away with a loud noise, and the elements will be dissolved with fire, and the earth and everything that is done on it will be disclosed.

Since all these things are to be dissolved in this way, what sort of persons ought you to be in leading lives of holiness and godliness, waiting for and hastening the coming of the day of God, because of which the heavens will be set ablaze and dissolved, and the elements will melt with fire? But, in accordance with his promise, we wait for new heavens and a new earth, where righteousness is at home.

Therefore, beloved, while you are waiting for these things, strive to be found by him at peace, without spot or blemish; and regard the patience of our Lord as salvation.




