Towards the Feast of the Incarnation

One of my favorite Christmas hymns is "In the Bleak Midwinter." I don't know why but the third verse of the hymn has always stuck with me. Christina Rossetti writes,

Angels and archangels may have gathered there cherubim and seraphim thronged the air but only his mother, in her maiden bliss worshipped the beloved with a kiss.

I love that. And, I absolutely love the music of this season. The hymns we will sing these next few weeks are some of the most beloved of all time. You might even say it isn't Christmas yet, until some of them are sung - take for instance Silent Night. I wonder what your favorite Christmas hymns are? And why? Hymns are more than just songs and there is always a story to tell about why that is the case.

In concert with the poetry and theology of our hymnody we approach one of the greatest mysteries of the Church's year of grace in the Incarnation. As is the case with the great mysteries of the Christmas and Easter, recounting the story is one of our greatest joys whether it be through poetry or prose. There is something that is deeply enchanting about what T.S. Elliot called "the still point of a turning world." For such is Christmas.

That story is indeed rich, with a cast of familiar characters: shepherds and angels, wise men from the East, the innkeeper, and of course Mary and Joseph. I know that folks here at Luke's Place know the people of the inn quite well, however, with each passing year though much of the magic of the season stays the same, how we remember the story sometimes connects with us in different ways. Whatever way it does connect with you is important and I encourage you to follow where that connection leads you this season.

My friends, I want to wish you all a blessed Christmas. I hope that the good news of Christ's birth kindles in you the fire of both love and spirit in a new and exciting way. I hope that through the mystery of the Incarnation you come to know just how fiercely God loves you and that so does your church family too.



The Gift of Presence

One of the highlights of Christmas for me as a child was my grandmother coming to visit and staying with us for a week. She lived far away, so a visit from her was always a special occasion. All this was magnified when she visited over the holidays. My sister and I would gather on the couch with her for hours, watching all the classic holiday movies. As I write this now, I vividly remember the magic of watching *Miracle on 34th Street* with her every year. And we when were done watching movies, it was off to the kitchen to make cookies together.

It's enlightening that I have so many powerful memories of her visits, yet I cannot remember one Christmas present that she ever gave to me. I do not doubt that she gave us all presents, it's just that I have no recollection of them. What I remember instead is her presence. That was indeed the greatest gift she could have given us, and she shared that gift abundantly.

If you celebrate the holidays by exchanging gifts and find yourself stressing out about finding just the right present, perhaps my story will be enlightening for you, too. I'm no Scrooge when it comes to presents; I just know that one of the best gifts we can give to family and friends is, to paraphrase Ralph Waldo Emerson, "a portion of ourselves."

The gift of our presence does not require any money, but it may require some internal work on our part. I know I cannot be truly present to someone if internally I am distracted. I also cannot be present if I am holding on to some kind of judgment, anger, or regret.

Many things can block our ability to show up fully in the important relationships in our lives. The holidays seem like a perfect time of year to let go of those barriers. It could turn out to be the best present we give to both ourselves and the people we love.

What is 'Pub Theology'? It's a time to gather informally and talk about different subjects around our core values of faith. What feeds your faith? Where did you see Jesus this week?


