From the Rector...



Ready for Thanksgiving? I really am now – a fresh perspective.

Lynda and I did our Thanksgiving shopping last week. The list was a bit lengthy, but normal for this holiday season. Smoked turkey, sweet potatoes, green bean casserole, frozen cherry salad, gravy, turkey, dressing – no rolls (too many calories).

My Mother, who will be ninety-six and one day, will join us for our feast. Her ticket to the Thanksgiving banquet will be a Pecan Pie and a Pumpkin Pie. She is the best!

Of course we will call the grandchildren and their parents and hear about their Thanksgiving and talk about plans for Christmas. Naturally we will give thanks for them and tell them we love them. No doubt there will be some gift suggestions from the youngest grandchildren. We don't even ask The Twins – we know it is money.

So we will eat too much as usual. Then we will turn on the TV for the Dallas football game --- and start our first nap of the day – or it could be the second.

Of yes, I will start the day with a Thanksgiving Holy Eucharist at 10:00. I suspect there will be a handful of people – sort of like the eight o'clock service on Sunday. There isn't a big demand for this worship service – not on Thanksgiving Day. I wonder if I will go to the Thanksgiving service in retirement – who would know?

Then today brought Thanksgiving home to me in a different way. In fact it reminded me why I write my "Gratitude Notes" each week. What happened? Well, I did a funeral. Not just any funeral. Not one of our older members who was ready. In fact it wasn't anyone I knew. I only did the funeral because the woman was the sister of a parishioner.

This was one of those situations where I had never met the person who had died and yet the family wanted me to do the homily. Amanda had been baptized at St. Luke's many years ago as an adult, but apparently lost connection with the church. I learned about her by listening to the family describe Amanda and tell stories about her life. Best I could discern, much of life had been difficult for her and yet she had many friends – indeed the church was close to full.

Amanda was forty-six – died of what appeared to be a massive blood clot. The family was devastated. Pain was everywhere and emotions raw.

In the service I admitted I didn't know Amanda. Then I did my best to take the family's description of Amanda's life and talked about her – trusting that would help people remember their experiences with Amanda.

Then I told the family and friends what I do know about Amanda. She is a child of God – always has been and always will be. She had experienced life as a gift from God – loved with every breath of her life and beyond. For Amanda, "life is changed, not ended" (BCP). This is the gift of life and grace we can know for her and each of us through Jesus Christ.

While Amanda's death is too soon and in Thanksgiving week, her loss is a reminder of our giftedness in life – from and with God – and relationships that matter every day. Without regrets of what is past nor waiting for a better time in the future, every "today" calls for paying attention to what matters – what gives meaning – who enriches our lives – and celebrating Thanksgiving at a new level. Indeed, the level where God is known and experienced as the Source and Presence and Grace.

Now I am ready for Thanksgiving. What about you?

NEW RECTOR SEARCH PROCESS - PARISH UPDATE

Bishop Ed and Jim Liehr communicated this week about the status of our rector search process. While the position announcement has been up on the Diocesan Webpage for couple of weeks, they received a couple of inquiries, but no actual applications.

Bishop Ed said that Canon Bill is well-aware of our need to get rector candidates in to our search process. He will be working with the diocesan staff to make that happen. As a reminder, Canon Bill Carroll will be part-time in the diocesan office and part time at Emmanuel through the end of the year as they transition the Canon's Office.

Bishop Ed reminded us that search processes slow down dramatically during the holiday period starting with Thanksgiving. This is not a reflection on St. Luke's but just something we know from experience. He does not want us to get discouraged if things are not moving along as rapidly as we hope.

Very importantly, Bishop Ed stressed to Jim that "St. Luke's has great leadership - both Lay and Clergy. Fr. Sean will be here after Fr. Lee's departure to make sure there is a pastoral and sacramental presence".

We ask you to pray for the rector candidates, Search Committee, and Vestry during our mutual discernment process for our next rector.

Come to the Table. It's something we say every Sunday, right? The powerful moment of communion within our walls reaches into our souls and nourishes us with eternal food and drink. There is power in that shared meal. This week, many—if not all—of us will be gathering around tables with our families, friends and neighbors in celebration of Thanksgiving. I have read multiple memes and jokes lately on the internet and in newspapers that all seem to contain a sarcastic and even pessimistic view of this holiday season: "There's not enough wine at the table this year to (enter flippant or snarky remark here)." This concerns me.

Growing up, Thanksgiving was the only time during the year that I had an opportunity to see all my family: Four aunts and uncles, two great uncles, two sets of grandparents, countless cousins and even a few strangers that did not have anywhere else to go. Looking back I remember minor disagreements over the way the gravy was made and who was to sit where, but, all in all, when we came together in a misshapen hand-linked circle, something unexplainable happened: Everyone quelled their tempers, lost their agendas and looked at the back of their eyelids as a prayer began. Those were sacred moments. We had Baptists and Church of Christers, Methodists and Episcopalians, and invariably the 'nones' that had no affiliation with any church. Yet there we were; a family of blood and love coming together to give thanks for ourselves and those around us, regardless of the personal 'stuff'.

Those moments are not lost on me and, even now, continue to breathe yearning into my heart for coming together. Even while the faces change in age, newness and absence I still look forward to reaching out and grabbing the hand next to me. Although I miss holding my father and grandfather's hands, my grandmother and great uncle's hands, I still yearn for that sacred moment when everything is still and we that are still together, all bow together in thanks for one another and for God.

Now that think about it, Thanksgiving dinner happens weekly for me...with you. No matter what occurs during the week in terms of arguments we have over theology or policy, disputes on how and where to spend money, or even how to make the communion bread, I still anticipate our time together in that stillness when we come to the table. And I am always certain there is plenty of wine.

This week, I hope you are surrounded by those important to you, that you are thankful for their faults and their strengths and that they are thankful for yours. Beyond that, I hope that you come to the table, wherever that may be, and reach out your hands to the person next

to you with a hopeful grip, knowing that there is plenty of wine and plenty of memories yet to be made regardless of the outside arguments that can stand in the way. Travel safely if you are traveling, host warmly if you are hosting, but above all else be thankful for the moments you have with those around you; and give thanks to God that you have each other.
