## **New Beginnings**

Many moons ago, I attended a workshop on Grief presented by the Menninger Foundation in Topeka, Kansas. The "key" phrase during this workshop was, "Without endings, there can be no new beginnings". This theme was defined as a process of addressing changes that occur in everyone's life. Changes can include a new job or a position within one's current company, a change of where one resides, and changes which revolve around death. The very notion of "change" implies the ending of one thing, and the beginning of another. Change also brings with it feelings of despair, gloom & doom, and feelings of adventure, curiosity, and excitement. Finally, change presents us with a challenge to break out of our comfort zone, and experience something new and refreshing.

My observations from the pew as a Retired Priest, and now as your Interim Priest have, over the past year, caused me to reflect on this "without endings, there can be no new beginnings". The family of St. Luke's is transitioning from one "era" 20 years in the making into a new one with unknown qualities. What will happen? What will the new Priest be like? What will he change?...Will I like his wife?...Will I like his kids?...Will I like him? These questions, and others, will be asked at some point if not already. What will this "change" bring? What will the challenges consist of?

I am reminded of a story about a Farmer who had asked his young son to go to the barn after dark to fetch an item and return it to the house. The little boy, having never been asked to do something like this before and was terrified of the dark because he could not see what was in front of him, was reluctant to do what his dad had asked of him. The dad, sensing this apprehension in his son, handed him a lantern, and instructed the boy to hold the lantern up in front of him, and walk to the "edge" of the light as he made his way to the barn and back.

The beginning of a new era at St. Luke's is before each of us, and will have its launching in a few short weeks. With the new beginnings will come challenges unique to our new priest as he settles into an environment we call Bartlesville, and as we settle into the unique person/ministry he will bring to us known as "Father Steve". New beginnings for all of us...WOW...how exciting is that?

### **Experiencing a Caring Community**

Recently Connie and I needed help because we were required to trim and/or remove lots of brush and over-hanging tree limbs by the city. Whoa! Not only am I no longer able to do that scale of a job alone anymore, (yes, I'm getting older) but even worse, I was already committed to being out of town for a week! Deacon Lauri got wind of this problem and suggested that the Men's Group could probably do it! I freaked! No, I couldn't ask them to do that! They were already being asked to do lots of church projects and besides, what would they think of me? I wasn't even a member of the group!!

"Deacon Doug enjoying Colorado with his daughter while his wife slaves at home to face this situation?" I felt embarrassed! Bob Wesneski came by with Lauri and pronounced the job do-able and within a day or two had enlisted 15 people to bring their tools and three trailers the following Saturday to do the job. They did it in a little over six hours. All had a good time, came and left as their schedule allowed, got a great lunch, and enjoyed "male bonding" as well. Margaret, who cares for the plantings at church, and Lauri also came and worked.

As It turns out, I realized that I was very comfortable serving others in their time of need, but when it came to admitting my own helplessness and inability in my situation, I was suddenly unable to accept that this time I was to be the beneficiary of our church's community of caring. But now I feel genuine love and concern from my friends who gave so unselfishly to Connie and me. I realize, too, that other aging or otherwise needy members of our church community might feel this same embarrassment when they find themselves unable to meet their own needs. Inreach to our own is as important as outreach to those we are used to helping. The need may be more than we think, and the silence of our seniors may be more out of undeserved shame than just an absence of need.

When offering assistance to those needing meals, or a ride to church, or even financial help, inreach to our own carries this additional dimension of sensitivity. Learning that we all need real help from time to time (or even for a long time) requires that we get over who we "used to be" and accept ourselves as Children of God, deserving God's love through His church.

- **3)** Hugh and Virginia do not eat lunch or breakfast so no need to worry about those meals. They do like to eat around 4:30.
- **4)** They would like for you to stay a bit when you deliver the meals. A short visit of ten or fifteen minutes would be great.

Also, a reminder that a schedule of those who are due to take meals is printed each week on the back page of the Steeple.
