Gracious and loving God we lift our hearts and minds to you so that we may see you more clearly and love you more dearly.

Salutation:

Bishop Ed, members of the clergy, vestry and family of St. Luke's, friends and family of Stephen's, I am honored to join you today for this special occasion. Stephen and Tracey, I bring you greetings and blessings from all of your friends at Ascension who stand with you in pride and love.

Homily:

This morning's Gospel passage is exemplified for me everyday, as I work in my garden. You see, a few years ago I retired from a long career in healthcare administration. I built my new home, and moved from the northeast back to Birmingham.

My goal was to become an urban farmer. So, I built raised beds for vegetables, and planted quite a few fruit trees. Next, I had an elaborate wood and steel wire arbor constructed, replete with a 20-ft center beam, for the vines to eventually canopy.

I planted three muscadine vines and one scuppernong vine in hopes that their self-propagation would eventually yield a fine harvest of blended grapes for some great tasting wine. So, I can honestly tell you that I know a thing or two about vine growing.

The funny thing is vines are a lot like people. They require a lot of tending. Vines have to be trained, they have to be tethered. An untended vine can go terribly wrong. Vines require feeding, they have to be propped up from time to time. And, periodically vines require pruning.

Vines have remarkable tinsel strength. They send out branches that seek objects to attach themselves to, and they squirm and ramble in response to daily circadian rhythm. Vines, through their branches climb, creep and sprawl. But, most importantly, vines require a lot of handholding, tending.

As you can see there are many similarities between vines and people.

God is the consummate vine grower and he gave us Jesus as the true vine. You know in established vineyards, the true vine grows into a substantive, thick, gnarly, support that is the genesis of all the other smaller vines that will in time produce grapes.

Jesus isn't the root or the stem, he is the true vine. From this holy image we can clearly understand that the church is meant to be the branches, or the smaller vines yet, they need constant tending, or TLC.

The command of love is front and center throughout the Gospel of John. The Greek word agape, which means love is used 57 times in John, more often than in the other gospels combined.

Jesus had compassion for the people who had struggled under the old law of God. He knew their wandering's and repeated failure's.

Jesus came to blow up that hard, strict way of living, that old covenant law, by giving an incredibly simple, new commandment.

Jesus said "Love. Just love one another. Love as I have loved you. I call you friends. You did not choose me but, I chose you to love."

So much about Jesus' ministry was choosing his followers. Jesus went to great lengths to share his love far and wide by searching and calling forth his disciples and followers from myriad walks of life. He searched and then chose them: from the sea, to right down from a sycamore tree, from seedy down under, to weddings, from gardens, to mass feedings, from funerals, and even from a quiet encounter at a water well.

So I think vines and branches are indeed a lot like people in that they almost always go their own way, even if it is not the right way, unless they are lovingly tended to.

Vines have definite characteristics, and to get the best out of them, those characteristics have to be considered not after the vines are well on their way in their little lives but, when they are set into the ground.

Jesus had the innate ability to see right into the heart of every person he encountered, and he invariably found their redeeming characteristics in every person he chose.

In our <u>celebrations</u> today we also honor Saint Matthias, the 13th apostle. He was chosen by his peers to replace Judas Iscariot, because of his fundamental desire to always put Christ first. Matthias faithfully followed Christ from the beginning of his ministry to the Lord's ascension.

Clement of Alexandria said that Matthias, like all the other apostles, was not chosen by Jesus for what he already was, but for what Jesus <u>foresaw</u> he would become. He was elected not because he was worthy but, because he would become worthy.

Now you, the people of St. Luke's have chosen Stephen because of his worthiness. He has come to <u>serve</u>, <u>lead</u>, and <u>love</u> you. You've chosen him to tend you as the branches of this parish, so that the church may further creep and crawl more deeply into it's heavenly calling.

As parish, your task is not complete by simply choosing Stephen as your rector. No you must tend him, too. You must care for him.

You must collaborate and agree on a common vision, then put in place realistic checks and balances, to make certain you stay faithful to how God is calling you together, as priest and parish.

Together, as head and body, you must continually examine what Jesus is urging you to become. Working collaboratively your barometer must be this: how do we, how does the community of Bartlesville, and the Diocese of Oklahoma, see the reflection of Jesus in the life and mission of our parish?

Together, as priest and parish you are responsible for spreading the love and word of Jesus Christ, as he is the true vine and you are the branches, the smaller vines.

Stephen you have a formidable responsibility as the new parish rector. You are to care-take the vine, you are to grow the branches, by being the man of God I know you to be.

As priest, and leader of St. Luke's, Stephen you are to point to God in everything you do. And, as St Francis so poetically said, - 'you are to preach the Gospel at all times, and use words if necessary.'

The scripted process for searching and calling a new rector is filled with tasks and tedium. I know as a body of Christ, that your due diligence and discovery, throughout the 'search process,' led you to make acquaintance with some very talented and stand out priests.

Today we celebrate that hard work of your vestry and parish, in the absolute best decision you could have possibly made, by choosing Father Stephen Dale Hood.

Let me tell you why, because I know, <u>not</u> <u>only</u> a thing or two about vines, but I <u>know</u> Stephen Hood.

Stephen was born to be a priest. He has a natural and deep love for Christ. His moral compass is grounded in the true north of Jesus.

Stephen is a passionate man. He fiercely loves Tracey, and he adores his children. He is a family man. He's passionate about many things, one in particular--car racing. So much so that he had a permanent, cardboard, office assistant, named—Dale Jr.

As an Eagle Scout, and a life long naturalist, he is a primary author of being prepared.

He is a renaissance man. A man you would want with you, on a long journey.

Even though he is the manliest of men, he has a gentle soul and a meekness that is enduring and endearing.

As a fellow clergy with him, I found his theology to be as pure as the driven snow and utterly uncomplicated--- God is love.

Stephen is a proven leader, a visionary, and he defines that 'can do' mentality. He inspires and he tends. He knows how to sit quietly and listen, and he listens with his heart.

Now Stephen is a big man, a size 15 shoe, and he is accustomed, because of his height, to towering over others, yet the most <u>organic</u> component of him is anchored in his humility.

In each parish that Stephen has served in, he has embodied love. He always errs on the side of compassion. A helpmate to families, a friend to the needy, a faithful servant, a reliable colleague, an engaged leader, faithful to his parishioners and his Bishop.

Every parish has characteristics that they need a leader to help them identify, and build on. Stephen can do this but, he needs each of you, the collective whole of you, to stay true to the fundamental task of 'what is Jesus calling us to be'?

So, I think vines are like veins, whose primary function is to carry the oxygen rich blood that courses through our very beings to sustain us, nourish us and grow us. Jesus, the true vine, sprawls his divinity and humanity into each of us.

As we come to the table again and again to fortify, and refuel, we are nourished by Christ's love so that we may bear fruit, as priest and parish, and take it out into the world.

God is always straining to meet us where we are, just as the tender branches of the summer vines strain to reach the light from above. As the living body of Christ, Stephen and St. Luke's, <u>now</u> is your time, now is the beginning of a new increment in your spiritual history together.

God is reaching to us even now. Beckoning us to embrace and stand on the holy ground of this spiritual union of priest and parish. If we listen, not only with our ears, rather with our hearts, then I just know we will but hear the beautiful breath of heaven, God's very ruach, saying --well done my good and faithful servant.

This glorious celebration happens today because each of us have been chosen by Jesus to bear fruit. Jesus knows all of our hearts, and he has shown you Stephen, and knitted you together, to carry on the Good News.

May your new life be filled with grace, and may the love of the one true vine, Jesus Christ, sustain and support the newly intertwined vines of priest and parish, so that together, you may bear abundant fruit.
