

All: Bishop Ed sent out a pastoral letter on the coronavirus earlier in the week. Regarding the virus, he wrote: Our role in responding, as churches, dioceses and compassionate Christians, is to:

- Combat fear with knowledge in order to encourage preparedness and decrease stigma.
- Maintain operational continuity and continue worship life in case of potential quarantine or disruption.
- Show God's compassion and care to those in our communities who are affected.


In that spirit, St. Luke's will continue to serve our community by following best practices. We will follow the direction of local and state health officials as well as any instructions that come from the diocese. I will be meeting with our lay leaders in the next few days to look at ways in which we can worship together while minimizing exposure to the spread of illnesses.

As it stands right now, there are no confirmed cases of coronavirus in Oklahoma, but I don't want to wait until it is here to take action. At the same time, I don't want to overreact. Currently, best practices suggest that regular hand washing and minimizing personal contact like hand shaking are helpful in reducing the spread of coronavirus as well as the cold and flu.

- If you are ill or your immune system is compromised, please stay home. Contact the church and someone can bring communion to you.
- I will be commissioning some lay members to as Lay Eucharistic Visitors to bring communion to members in their homes.
- When you are at church, minimize personal contact. If someone doesn't want to shake hands or hug, please honor their wishes. I rarely exchange *The Peace* during flu season, and I also use hand sanitizer after the *The Peace*. One of the protocols I will be implementing is the altar party will be washing our hands vigorously in the sacristy between *The Peace* and before distributing communion.
- If you are worried about the common cup, you don't have to receive the wine. However, epidemiological studies have found the common cup is safe when best practices are followed. However, if your immune system is compromised, it would be prudent to refrain from the common cup at Holy Communion (especially during cold and flu season). Also, we may explore using *Morning Prayer* for a time if coronavirus begins to spread locally.



COVID-19 / Coronavirus: Awareness and Response

The emergence of cases of COVID-19 (the "coronavirus") in Europe, and recent deaths in northern Italy associated with the virus, should be a matter of concern to all of our communities.

There are basic steps each of our communities can follow to minimize risks to all of our people and the ministries to which they contribute or by which they are served.

First, the best advice on precautions to take is provided on the website of the World Health Organization (https://www.who.int/emergencies/diseases/novel-coronavirus-2019). Information is available in English, French, and Spanish.


To summarize the WHO suggestions:

- Wash your hands frequently, using soap and water or an alcohol-based rub. All eucharistic ministers should use an alcohol-based rub before the distribution of the sacrament, whether in the context of the liturgy or in visiting someone at home or in the hospital.
- Practice respiratory hygiene. Cover your mouth when sneezing or coughing; discard tissues immediately in closed bins.
- Practice social distancing. In general, maintain a distance of a meter between you
 and others, particular those who are coughing, sneezing, or evidently ill.
- · Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth.
- Any parishes involved in ministries in which food is served should give particular attention to The WHO recommendations regarding food safety.
- Needless to say, we should send a clear message that if anyone feels ill or unwell, they should, as a general rule, seek medical care immediately and not attend parish
- Related to this, if someone who is elderly or lives alone does not appear at church in what would otherwise be a regular function, create systems for wellness checks.

Caring for each other and for all the people of God means being careful in the midst of an epidemic. With a reasonable amount of caution we can keep our people, our communities, and those we serve healthy—and continue to minister to those who are ill and in need of our care.
