Parish Profile Completed!

Our St. Luke's Parish Profile was completed and provided to Canon Eric Cooter this week so the Diocese's recruitment process can start in earnest. Nancy Woods did a terrific job on the design, and the whole congregation can take pride in this presentation of our church. Printed copies of the profile are now available in the church office, and we will be posting it on the St. Luke's website soon.

I want to give a hearty shout-out to one of our members who last week received a statewide honor in public education. She is Heather Boyle, a long-time educator in the Bartlesville school district who was instrumental in the 2018 teacher walkout to improve funding for public education in Oklahoma. As you will recall, St. Luke's served as the local Hospitality and Communications Center for teachers and education advocates during that period.

Heather has been named as the 2020 recipient of the Oklahoma Education Association's Kate Frank Award to honor her passionate leadership inside and outside the classroom. The award is presented to an OEA member or local association who renders outstanding and significant service to advancing the cause of member welfare, rights and professionalism.

Heather is also Oklahoma's 2021 nominee for the National Education Association Foundation's Award for Teaching Excellence. This award, to be announced in February 2021, is the highest honor that can be bestowed upon a teacher by the organization.

Following many years as a teacher at Wayside Elementary School, Heather was selected last year to leads the district's Academic Therapeutic Learning Alternative Setting (ATLAS) program. This first-of-its-kind program pulls students who aren't academically successful due to childhood trauma from the district's six elementary schools and provides specialized education in a comfortable learning environment.

Congratulations to Heather from the entire St. Luke's family! Give her a fist-bump if you see her in person, high-five over Zoom or a thumps-up phone message for being a true example of living with Arms Wide Open.



Arms Wide Open to Those in Need

A church family needs our help

Tim and Julie Middleton, a young family who began attending St. Luke's regularly lst year, are in desperate need of helping hands after discovering recently that their home has serious mold contamination. The condition is so serious that they are having to dispose of nearly all of their belongings, including: clothing, furniture, books, photo albums and most of the toys belonging to their two children – Fiona, 4, and Riley, almost 2. Tim and Julie hope to sell their home and rent or purchase a smaller place. However, they cannot do this without first addressing the costly mold issue, only a fraction of which is covered by insurance.

Friends and family have set up a GoFundMe page for the Middletons, which describes their plight in more detail. You are encouraged to read it and then look into your heart for how you can reach out to a member family needing our prayers and support at this challenging time. A divorced mother hasn't seen her children

Through her work at St. Luke's, Office Manager Roseanne McKee learned of a need and has organized a fundraiser on behalf of a divorced woman living in Bartlesville named Emily. Despite an established custody agreement with her ex-husband, Emily has not seen or spoken with her children, age 8 and 10, since early this spring.

Roseanne and others are assisting Emily in enforcing the custody agreement by engaging the Murray Law Firm in Stillwater, as the divorce took place in Noble County. A \$2,000 retainer is needed, and thanks to an outpouring of support from the community and two successful yard sales, \$1,670 has been raised.

If you would like to help by donating funds, checks may be made payable to the Murray Law Firm and dropped in the St. Luke's locked mailbox outside the north doors. Items for the upcoming yard sales 8/15 and 8/29 can be dropped off on Roseanne's screened-in porch at 1328 S. Cherokee Ave. in Bartlesville.

In addition, Roseanne and her mother-in-law have sewn double-sided table runners, which are for sale for \$10 each. They are on display in the glass case in the narthex. If you are interested in purchasing one of them, call Roseanne at the office at 918-287-8784.



St. Luke's has been a vital part of the Pack the Backpacks program since its inception in 2003, with nearly 2,500 students benefiting every year. The COVID-19 situation has curtailed the normal distribution event held at the church facilities. Instead, this year school supplies are being delivered directly to schools, where teachers will provide them to students. School deliveries are already underway, but the Washington County School Supply Drive is still short of some items.

The Lessons

Genesis 37:1-4, 12-28

Jacob settled in the land where his father had lived as an alien, the land of Canaan. This is the story of the family of Jacob.

Joseph, being seventeen years old, was shepherding the flock with his brothers; he was a helper to the sons of Bilhah and Zilpah, his father's wives; and Joseph brought a bad report of them to their father. Now Israel loved Joseph more than any other of his children, because he was the son of his old age; and he had made him a long robe with sleeves. But when his brothers saw that their father loved him more than all his brothers, they hated him, and could not speak peaceably to him.

Now his brothers went to pasture their father's flock near Shechem. And Israel said to Joseph, "Are not your brothers pasturing the flock at Shechem? Come, I will send you to them." He answered, "Here I am." So he said to him, "Go now, see if it is well with your brothers and with the flock; and bring

word back to me." So he sent him from the valley of Hebron.

He came to Shechem, and a man found him wandering in the fields; the man asked him, "What are you seeking?" "I am seeking my brothers," he said; "tell me, please, where they are pasturing the flock." The man said, "They have gone away, for I heard them say, 'Let us go to Dothan." So Joseph went after his brothers, and found them at Dothan. They saw him from a distance, and before he came near to them, they conspired to kill him. They said to one another, "Here comes this dreamer. Come now, let us kill him and throw him into one of the pits; then we shall say that a wild animal has devoured him, and we shall see what will become of his dreams." But when Reuben heard it, he delivered him out of their hands, saving, "Let us not take his life." Reuben said to them, "Shed no blood; throw him into this pit here in the wilderness, but lay no hand on him" —that he might rescue him out of their hand and restore him to his father. So when Joseph came to his brothers, they stripped him of his robe, the long robe with sleeves that he wore; and they took him and threw him into a pit. The pit was empty; there was no water in it.

Then they sat down to eat; and looking up they saw a caravan of Ishmaelites coming from Gilead, with their camels carrying gum, balm, and resin, on their way to carry it down to Egypt. Then Judah said to his brothers, "What profit is it if we kill our brother and conceal his blood? Come, let us sell him to the Ishmaelites, and not lay our hands on him, for he is our brother, our own flesh." And his brothers agreed. When some Midianite traders passed by, they drew Joseph up, lifting him out of the pit, and sold him to the Ishmaelites for twenty pieces of silver. And they took Joseph to Egypt.

The Reader says Here ends the Lesson.

Romans 8:26-39

The Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words. And God, who searches the heart, knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God.We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose. For those whom he foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son, in order that he might be the firstborn within a large family. And those whom he predestined he also called; and those whom he called he also justified; and those whom he justified he also glorified. What then are we to say about these things? If God is for us, who is against us? He who did not withhold his own Son, but gave him up for all of us, will he not with him also give us everything else? Who will bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. Who is to condemn? It is Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? As it is written, "For your sake we are being killed all day long; we are accounted as sheep to be slaughtered." No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

The Gospel: Matthew 14:22-33

Jesus made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side, while he dismissed the crowds. And after he had dismissed the crowds, he went up the mountain by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, but by this time the boat, battered by the waves, was far from the land, for the wind was against them. And early in the morning he came walking toward them on the sea. But when the disciples saw him walking on the sea, they were terrified, saying, "It is a ghost!" And they cried out in fear. But immediately Jesus spoke to them and said, "Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid."

Peter answered him, "Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water." He said, "Come." So Peter got out of the

boat, started walking on the water, and came toward Jesus. But when he noticed the strong wind, he became frightened, and beginning to sink, he cried out, "Lord, save me!" Jesus immediately reached out his hand and caught him, saying to him, "You of little faith, why did you doubt?" When they got into the boat, the wind ceased. And those in the boat worshiped him, saying, "Truly you are the Son of God."

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and

when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me." Therefore, we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Celebrant and People

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

Celebrant continues

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and forever. *AMEN*.

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

People and Celebrant

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. *Amen*.

The Breaking of the Bread

Celebrant Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us;

People Therefore, let us keep the feast.

Facing the people, the Celebrant says the following Invitation

The Gifts of God for the People of God.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the people will receive the bread only.

Post Communion Prayer

Celebrant and People

Eternal God, heavenly Father, you have graciously accepted us as living members of your Son our Savior Jesus Christ, and you have fed us with spiritual food in the Sacrament of his Body and Blood. Send us now into the world in peace and grant us strength and courage to love and serve you with gladness and singleness of heart; through Christ our Lord. *Amen*.

Blessing and Dismissal

Celebrant Let us go forth in the name of Christ.

People Thanks be to God.
