Calm in Unsettled Times

This week has been a moment of high anxiety for just about everyone, regardless of where you stand politically. And as I write this, the anxiety continues. But regardless of the outcome of the national election, we continue to pray now and will continue to pray each Sunday:

We pray for all who govern and hold authority in the nations of the world; That there may be justice and peace on the earth.

At this unsettled time, the St. Luke's worship team, which plans each Sunday's service, found great comfort and inspiration from Presiding Bishop's Michael Curry's powerful message from the national church's <u>"Holding on to Hope: A National Service for Healing and Wholeness"</u> held just prior to the election.

This coming Sunday morning, Kris Bonner and I will be presenting some selected excerpts from the Presiding Bishop Curry's sermon as the homily for this Morning Prayer service. Before or after that, you may if you have internet access hear his sermon <u>"Our Values Matter"</u> in its entirety. We heartily recommend it. We feel his message must be ever-present in our minds and in our actions as we move forward as a church, community and nation.

Please continue to take care of each other and your loved ones as the pandemic continues to spread in our state. Yesterday, new Oklahoma cases reached an all time high of 2,101 and hospitalizations for COVID-19 or suspected cases of the virus surpassed 1,000. Health care workers are under great stress. Even if hospital beds are physically available, that's only a number if there isn't enough staff to provide adequate care.

As you know, St. Luke's (thanks to Margaret's meticulous help) has been taking every precaution to keep our church home safe for everyone. But we must continue to be vigilant elsewhere, wherever we go in the community. To be sure, we are weary of the restrictions. But we cannot tire of caring for neighbors, just as we care for ourselves. We owe it to one another.



The Lessons

Joshua 24:1-3a, 14-25

Joshua gathered all the tribes of Israel to Shechem,

and summoned the elders, the heads, the judges, and the officers of Israel; and they presented themselves before God. And Joshua said to all the people, "Thus says the LORD, the God of Israel: Long ago your ancestors— Terah and his sons Abraham and Nahor—lived beyond the Euphrates and served other gods. Then I took your father Abraham from beyond the River and led him through all the land of Canaan and made his offspring many.

"Now therefore revere the LORD, and serve him in sincerity and in faithfulness; put away the gods that your ancestors served beyond the River and in Egypt, and serve the LORD. Now if you are unwilling to serve the LORD, choose this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your ancestors served in the region beyond the River or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are living; but as for me and my household, we will serve the LORD."

Then the people answered, "Far be it from us that we should forsake the LORD to

serve other gods; for it is the LORD our God who brought us and our ancestors up from the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery, and who did those great signs in our sight. He protected us along all the way that we went, and among all the peoples through whom we passed; and the LORD drove out before us all the peoples, the Amorites who lived in the land. Therefore we also will serve the LORD, for he is our God."

But Joshua said to the people, "You cannot serve the LORD, for he is a holy God. He is a jealous God; he will not forgive your transgressions or your sins. If you forsake the LORD and serve foreign gods, then he will turn and do you harm, and consume you, after having done you good." And the people said to Joshua, "No, we will serve the LORD!" Then Joshua said to the people, "You are witnesses against yourselves that you have chosen the LORD, to serve him." And they said, "We are witnesses." He said, "Then put away the foreign gods that are among you, and incline your hearts to

the LORD, the God of Israel." The people said to Joshua, "The LORD our God we will serve, and him we will obey." So Joshua made a covenant with the people that day, and made statutes and ordinances for them at Shechem.

Thessalonians 4:13-18

We do not want you to be uninformed, brothers and sisters, about those who have died, so that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have died. For this we declare to you by the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will by no means precede those who have died. For the Lord himself, with a cry of command, with the archangel's call and with the sound of God's trumpet, will descend from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first. Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up in the clouds together with them to meet the Lord in the air; and so we will be with the Lord forever.




