New Rhythms

I chuckled when Dan mentioned that fire hoses needed to be employed when disseminating all the information a senior warden must when a new pastor arrives. I can tell you from firsthand experience though, that Dan Droege is an excellent judge of the amount of information one can receive and digest in any given day. As a communicator by trade, he listens first and I have so appreciated that. Over the past week we have worked closely together – dreaming, planning, and reflecting on the patterns at work in our life in Christ and how those patterns will be lived into as our community continues to grow and as we learn each other's rhythms.

Among the many blessings of this life, time, is one of the most precious. Some of the most important work of our lives is in the way that we sanctify that time and bear witness to its passing by living into the present moment. Someone once told me that ministry happens in the interruptions. That statement is absolutely true. So, please do not ever think you are interrupting me or that if think you are that that is a bad thing. I want to hear from you. And, if I don't hear from you this is fair warning that I may come and find you! It is my honor to walk with you in love.

It occurs to me though, that knowing my schedule might be helpful. I plan on being in the office Monday through Thursday from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. From 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m., I plan on being out and about amongst you all. Having a few hours in the afternoon to get out in the community is a practice that I would like to continue. I've found that this time, when scheduled, is especially helpful in carving out a space where providing pastoral care can become a priority, not to mention a daily practice. Know that my desire as a pastor, as a fellow Christian, and as a friend is to be with you. We do not walk this road alone.

In my short time here, I've come to learn that I have entered into a rich witness of the Gospel at St. Luke's and I love that. The preacher's life depends on a rhythm and so I will continue my practice of study and of carrying the word out into the world. I'll do this with you because that is where I see God. A friend of

mine told me once that for every minute you preach you should spend an hour with someone in your congregation. It's a good rule of thumb because preaching is so much about our relationship. While I'll continue to set aside Thursday mornings for drafting my sermon, the work of preaching will be born out of our life together.

Finally, as my family makes their way towards Bartlesville today all I can think about is how I cannot wait to see them. I've missed them. I've missed their energy, though at the same time I've also appreciated the quiet time to process my new surroundings. You know, it's give and take with anything. But with their arrival, a balance that I have missed will be restored. Speaking of wonderful things, I'm also really looking forward to meeting with the intrepid leaders of our young disciples this week and dreaming with them about how we will navigate coming back together! 
Online & Mobile Giving Available

Second Lesson: A Reading from the First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians 1 Corinthians 8:1-13

Now concerning food sacrificed to idols: we know that "all of us possess knowledge." Knowledge puffs up, but love builds up. Anyone who claims to know something does not yet have the necessary knowledge; but anyone who loves God is known by him.

Hence, as to the eating of food offered to idols, we know that "no idol in the world really exists," and that "there is no God but one." Indeed, even though there may be so-called gods in heaven or on earth—as in fact there are many gods and many lords—yet for us there is one God, the Father, from whom are all things and for whom we exist, and one Lord, Jesus Christ, through whom are all things and through whom we exist.

It is not everyone, however, who has this knowledge. Since some have become so accustomed to idols until now, they still think of the food they eat as food offered to an idol; and their conscience, being weak, is defiled. "Food will not bring us close to God." We are no worse off if we do not eat, and no better off if we do. But take care that this liberty of yours does not somehow become a stumbling block to the weak. For if others see you, who possess knowledge, eating in the temple of an idol, might they not, since their conscience is weak, be encouraged to the point of eating food sacrificed to idols? So by your knowledge those weak believers for whom Christ died are destroyed. But when you thus sin against members of your family, and wound their conscience when it is weak, you sin against Christ. Therefore, if food is a cause of their falling, I will never eat meat, so that I may not cause one of them to fall.

The Gospel Mark 1:21-28
