

A long time ago I found a picture of my mom and dad tucked away in my dad's prayerbook. The picture was cracked and well worn, having been carried in between the pages since his ordination in 1986. I used to sit with his prayerbook and fan the pages out because I could still smell the faint sweetness of the pipe tobacco he used. And that's how I found this one – of both of them - just married, before my sisters and I were even thought of. And, it has become the picture I turn to on my birthday as I give thanks for them when I read, "Praised be

your father and mother, who loved you before you were, and trusted to call you here, with no idea who you'd be."

Around this time when I was on deployment several years ago, a package arrived in the mail. I had worn through my Armed Forces Prayer Book and for our anniversary Teresa sent me one just like my dad's – black leather with gold trim. Before I knew it, the binding on it began to stretch as I had added pictures, including theirs and all sorts of scraps of paper with notes on them. I'd often steal away for a few moments throughout the day to go and pray one of the devotions - but if I'm honest, just to look at the pictures like this one, tucked away next to the prayer entitled: For those we love (BCP, 831).



I've always wondered if Church Publishing would consider creating a prayerbook with extra pages in it so that it could accommodate more of our memories – "memories to harvest vanished days, of distance made intimate by the passing of years." But for now, I'll just tuck them in there.

As I begin another trip around the sun today, I want to give thanks to you, my St. Luke's family. Your faithfulness has enriched my family's life in so many ways. John Cassian Abbot at Marseilles, 435

Born in Romania around 365, John Cassian struggled with the problems of living the Christian life in a time when the world seemed to be falling apart. As a young man he traveled to a monastery in Bethlehem and later moved to Egypt, where he sought the tutelage of the great founders of the ascetic movement of the desert, such as Antony and Macarius.

At the heart of desert monasticism was the idea that the image of God in each person, tarnished by sin but not destroyed, yearns to and has the capacity to love God with the purity of heart with which God loves us. Their aim in desert solitude was to rid themselves of the anxieties and distractions that called their attention away from loving God.

Cassian was initiated into this tradition before political pressures forced him to leave Egypt in about 399. He moved to southern Gaul and, in about 415, founded a house in Marseilles for monks, and later a house for women religious. Though Cassian's goal, like that of his desert mentors, was the perfection of the individual soul, he insisted that no one should embark on a monastic vocation alone. One should enter a house where other monks are pursuing the same goal, live according to a time-tested rule, and thereby gain the guidance and companionship of the community.

Though Cassian remained committed to the desert ideal of individual perfection, his insistence on the necessity of Christian community and loving moderation was the basis for Benedictine monasticism, which eventually became the basic spirituality of the Western Church. It was perhaps a paradox that only in community could the Christian soul: "lose sight of earthly things in proportion to the inspiration of its purity so that .

.. with the inner gaze of the soul it sees the glorified Jesus coming in the splendor of His majesty."

Cassian died in Marseilles in about 435.

Together we pray: Holy One, whose beloved Son Jesus Christ didst bless the pure in heart: Grant that we, together with thy servant John Cassian and in union with

his prayers, may ever seek the purity with which to behold thee as thou art; one God, now and for ever. Amen.





