Lesser Fasts and Feasts

Priscilla and Aquilla (July 8th)

When Paul came to Corinth (probably in the year 50), he met Priscilla and her husband Aquila. Like Paul, they were tentmakers by trade, and had just arrived from Rome, from which the Emperor Claudius had recently expelled the Jewish community. It is not clear whether Aquila and Priscilla were already Christians before meeting Paul, or were converted by his preaching. After eighteen months, the three of them went together to Ephesus, where Priscilla and Aquila remained while Paul continued to Antioch.

Soon after, a man named Apollos came to Ephesus, who had heard and believed a portion of the Christian message, and was promoting that belief with eloquent

preaching, based on a thorough knowledge of the Hebrew Scriptures. Aquila and Priscilla befriended him and explained the Gospel to him more fully, after which he continued to preach with even greater effectiveness.

Priscilla and Aquila were apparently in Rome when Paul wrote to that congregation, and in Ephesus with Timothy when Paul wrote his last letter to Timothy. When Paul wrote to the Corinthians from Ephesus, he joined their greetings with his own. Clearly they were dear to Paul, and were earnest and effective in spreading the Good News of Christ and His saving work.

Altogether, Aquila and Priscilla are mentioned six times in the New Testament (Acts 18:2; Acts 18:18–19; Acts 18:26; Romans 16:3; 1 Corinthians 16:19; 2 Timothy 4:19), and the observant reader may note that in half of these Aquila's name comes first, while in the other half, Priscilla's comes first, as if to emphasize that they are being mentioned on equal terms.

One of the concerns of my 60-year-old Thai tutor, who is single and runs an outreach to local children, was that she might one day become a burden to her family in her old age. After we read the first part of Genesis 3 together, she was struck by how Adam looked first at all the animals before realizing that none of them were a suitable companion to him. He had to wait

until God gave him a companion who was just right for him. She said she wanted to do well in waiting for God to provide for her everything that was just right for her. I wanted to encourage her that she would always be a blessing to her family (who are not Christians) because she is God's child. We looked at Isaiah 56 together in Thai. She had not previously understood the significance of it. When she came to understand that an everlasting name (Isaiah 56:5) was better than sons and daughters (or any other advantage in this life), she felt so encouraged. When I left her yesterday morning, she felt confident that even if she was old and needed care from her family that she would always be a blessing, because she bears God's name.

This is very different from how Thai Buddhists think about well-being for the future. Their idea of well-being is to have money, health, family, friends and a good reputation. People who don't have these things assume they are reaping bad consequences from a previous life. Their main hopes are to suffer well, appease spirits, and hope for a streak of luck or a supernatural event. There is nothing that compares to being in our Savior's family and all that He provides for His own.

We thank all of you who prayed for Roger's ear during our international travel. He did not have pain. On arrival he was able to get hints about what might help his ear. Currently, his right ear is better, but his left ear is worse. He is hopeful that mucus will eventually drain out of both ears.

I was happy to receive responses from people about how we can pray for them! Please keep updating us on how to pray for you. We really appreciate knowing how to pray. We're very grateful for each of you. It's good to be family together.
