



Theologians Corner:



Reformation Sunday and All Hallowtide

Reformation Day, is the anniversary of the day Martin Luther is said to have posted his Ninety-five Theses on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany (October 31, 1517), later identified by Protestants as the beginning of the Reformation.

The European Lutheran territorial churches at first commemorated the Reformation on various days, among them the anniversary of Luther's birth (November 10), his death (February 18), and presentation of the Augsburg Confession (June 25). The centennial celebrations of 1617 focused attention on October 31. In the sesquicentennial year (1667), Elector of Saxony John George II decreed this date as annual Reformation Day in

Saxony. German Lutheran and Union territorial churches have gradually come to follow this example and specify October 31 or the Sunday following (or preceding).

Among English-speaking Lutherans, the churches that use the Lutheran Liturgy (1948) keep October 31 as Reformation Day. Those using the Service Book and Hymnal (1958) observe October 31 as Reformation Day and may keep the preceding Sunday as Reformation Sunday. The liturgical color is red. Many churches in the Reformed and the Evangelical traditions also mark the day, often with special services focused on the Reformation and its effects.

Beginning also on the evening of the 31st is the short season of Allhallowtide, encompassing the <u>triduum</u> of All Saints' Eve (<u>Halloween</u>), <u>All Saints' Day</u> (All Hallows') and <u>All Souls' Day</u>, as well as the <u>International Day of Prayer for the Persecuted</u> <u>Church</u> (observed on the first Sunday of November) and <u>Remembrance Sunday</u> (observed on the second Sunday in November) in some traditions.

Allhallowtide is a "time to remember the dead, including <u>martyrs</u>, <u>saints</u>, and all faithful departed Christians." The present date of <u>Hallowmas</u> (All Saints' Day) and thus also of its vigil (Hallowe'en) was established for Rome perhaps by <u>Pope Gregory III</u> (731–741) and was made of obligation throughout the <u>Frankish Empire</u> by <u>Louis the Pious</u> in 835. Elsewhere, other dates were observed even later, with the date in Ireland being 20 April. In the early 11th century, the modern date of All Souls' Day was popularized, after

Abbot <u>Odilo</u> established it as a day for the monks of Cluny and associated monasteries to <u>pray for the dead</u>.

Together we pray: Gracious Father, we pray for your holy catholic church. Fill it with all truth and peace. Where it is corrupt, purify it; where it is in error, direct it; where in anything it is amiss, reform it; where it is right, strengthen it; where it is in need, provide for it; where it is divided, reunite it; for the sake of your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Almighty God, you have knit together your elect in one communion and fellowship in the mystical body of your Son Christ our Lord: Give us grace so to follow your blessed saints in all virtuous and godly living, that we may come to those ineffable joys that you have prepared for those who truly love you; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, in glory everlasting. *Amen.*




We will have the Eucharist on both feast days, November 1 & 2, 2022 at 12:15pm in the Chapel.
