

# Theologian's Corner William W. Mayo and Charles Menninger Pioneers in Medicine

William W. Mayo, with his two sons, William J. Mayo and Charles H. Mayo, built St. Mary's, the first general hospital in Minnesota. When a devastating tornado struck Rochester, Minnesota, in August 1883, the Mayos joined with the Sisters of St. Francis to respond to the disaster. This partnership between the Episcopalian Mayos and the Roman Catholic Sisters raised a few eyebrows, but became well known for a new type of patient care that emphasized the whole person, spiritually as well as physically.

Building on a vision of doctors working as a team with other medical professionals, not as solo diagnosticians, the Mayos aggressively opened their doors to other doctors and medical researchers. St. Mary's Hospital and what would become The Mayo Clinic became a model for integrating

person-centered medical care with the best in cutting-edge scientific and medical research. The Mayo Clinics continue today as outstanding centers for patient care and medical research.

Charles F. Menninger, together with his sons, Karl and William, were pioneers in establishing a new kind of psychiatric treatment facility in Topeka, Kansas, founded in 1925. They played a major role in transforming the care of the mentally ill in ways that were not only more medically effective, but were also more humane. Among the notable accomplishments of the Menninger Clinic has been its advocacy for better treatment and a more informed public policy in support of the needs of the mentally ill.

In 1973, Dr. Karl Menninger wrote the influential book, Whatever Became of Sin? The work looks at sin—personal, corporate, and systemic—and insists that recognizing sin, within us and among us, is a key component in personal and relational health. He believed strongly that naming sin and dealing with its consequences contributes positively to good health in persons and in communities. The book was a standard textbook in theological seminaries for a generation or more.

The work of the Mayos and Menningers was transformative because of their commitment to treating the whole person—physically, emotionally, and spiritually.

Together we pray: Divine Physician, your Name is blessed for the work and witness of the Mayos and the Menningers, and the revolutionary developments that they brought to the practice of medicine. As Jesus went about healing the sick as a sign of the reign of God come near, bless and guide all those inspired to the work of

healing by thy Holy Spirit, that they may follow his example for the sake of thy kingdom and the health of thy people; through the same Jesus Christ, who with thee and the Holy Spirit liveth and reigneth, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

## News from Roger and Joanne Green In Thailand

The border opened last week. Our team has been making plans for people to come to the training center. For awhile now, Roger has been planning a training trip in a city in the nearby country. He hopes to leave mid-March. Please ask God to help Roger to successfully train three men who will begin to coordinate Scripture engagement training in their country.

Roger recently showed me an app he had created for a language group that is about to receive the New Testament translated into their language. The first app Roger created with the Scripture App Builder was for the Northern Thai New Testament. Since then Roger has created several more apps for other language groups. Christians in those groups enthusiastically receive these apps of the Bible in their own language. Please ask God to speed the process for the printing of this newest New Testament and to help the Christians to access their New Testament in both print and digital forms. Here is the response from one of the main translators after he received the app of the New Testament in his own language:

I am so happy to be able to see our Bible on my phone. I told all my brothers in Christ, and they are so happy to hear about this that we are going to be able to read our Bible on the phone easily.

A boys retreat in early May was confirmed. This retreat is being planned by the three Thai moms who were in the mother/daughter retreat that I led. One of the moms is a single mom with a son. She wants to have this event to help prepare him for honoring God in all his relationships. I'm helping the three moms with the details of the retreat and the curriculum. It's coming up soon. We're asking God to provide pastors and young adult men to facilitate the small groups. The topics include God's healing for disappointments about their parents, building a good relationship with parents, God's design for marriage, sons honoring God when the son is a friend, boyfriend, husband or father, and staying away from addictions. Please ask God to provide the men who will be good role models for the boys.

Thank you for praying for the research about supporting families with an alcoholic family member. There are a lot of problems with alcoholism in Thailand. I was able to find one lady who has been teaching the 12 steps to some Thai professionals. She met with Por to share information with her. When I next go to Chiang Mai, I hope to visit the first Thai-speaking Al-Anon group in Northern Thailand. Please ask God to start more Al-Anon groups in Northern Thailand, so that more families can be supported while living with someone who is alcoholic.

My heart was touched Saturday by a young man Phoo who will turn 18 in May. His two feet are turned inward, so he can't walk. He doesn't have the use of one of his arms. He has a slight mental disability, and his words are a bit slurred. He definitely has thoughts and opinions, though. Phoo's grandmother is a member at Aj. Koi's church. Aj. Koi will interpret for me to do a planning session with Phoo and his grandma. We will take time to understand Phoo better according to tools I learned in the person-centered thinking training. After Phoo turns 18, he will no longer receive services from schools. He currently goes to a special ed school on Wednesdays and Fridays. He said he is given coloring projects there and has been learning to massage. It will be good for Aj. Koi and me to talk with Phoo about options for the future. Please ask God to give us good ideas for options for Phoo.


