The Morning News

My son is learning to sleep with the lights off. I am super proud of him. Every day he takes a step closer to getting there. Last night he said, "I'm just going to leave my night light on... and the lava lamp." His mom and I both praised him for being brave.

Teresa and I kind of joke around and say to each other that there are two things we don't want our kid to be known for: being stinky or being

mean. If he gets a 62 on a math paper (which he hasn't yet; he must have got his mom's math genes) or if he doesn't make the varsity swimming team, the rest will sort itself out. And it will sort itself out because we trust in our community. We trust in our church family, Pax's school, and all the other helpers that make Bartlesville the community that it is – not perfect, but *our* hometown.

I brewed a fresh cup of coffee this morning. It was single as Teresa is in OKC this morning preparing for the Bishop's brunch. News of the shooting at Covenant Presbyterian was on – the familiar rhetoric and coverage almost commonplace now in the background -- save for the moments it really hits us.

Pax was in the kitchen - the crinkling of cellophane masking the news coverage as bags of chips went into his lunchbox. The sound roused me from my thoughts and soon he was standing right behind me. I sat there desensitized, watching someone shoot through a school door – and casually asked, "You good, bud?"

He asked gently, "Dad, do I have to go to school today?"

Casually I said, "Of course, you do.". Not even thinking that he wasn't looking at me but at the T.V.

He responded in a way that grabbed my attention immediately – it was a mixture of what you would call being crestfallen and worried as he said,

"Ok. I love you...."

He leaned over to give me a hug. It's a kind of a "bro" hug these days as he is getting older. Nevertheless, his head still sort of finds its way under mine. And as I have, ever since they were little, I smelled his head – half thinking to myself, "He took a shower last night, didn't he?" But also - noticing and feeling in my heart, this is *my* son, *my* beloved, in whom *I* am well pleased.

He let me go and made his way to the door, turned again and said, "I love you," almost as if it were a question. I think wishing I would say, "Just stay home with me bud, everything is going to be alright." But I didn't and the door closed behind him and he was off.

The news was still on.


And that's when I heard a mom say, "If it can happen here, it can happen anywhere."

I think Pax knew that this past Tuesday morning. I think that's why he knows there is probably an active shooter drill coming to Wayside soon. Probably wondering if his desk can stop a bullet. And why, when I think back to the moment he asked if he could stay home, someone on the news was asking, "How many more of our kids have to die, before something is done."

Theologians Corner: Richard, Bishop of Chichester, 1253

Born in Burford, Worcestershire, around 1197, Richard and his older brother Robert were quite young when their parents died, leaving a rich estate with a guardian to manage it. The guardian allowed the estate to dwindle, and Richard worked long hours to restore it.

Pressure was put on Richard to marry, but he, who from earliest years had preferred books to almost anything else, turned the estate over to his brother and went to Oxford. Often hungry, cold, and not always sure of his next day's keep, Richard managed to succeed in his studies under such teachers as Robert Grosseteste.

He continued to study law at Paris and Bologna, earned a doctorate, and returned to Oxford to become University Chancellor. Shortly afterward, the Archbishop of Canterbury, Edmund Rich, appointed him to be his own chancellor. The friendship between the primate and his young assistant was close: Richard also became his biographer. Conflict with King Henry III eventually forced Archbishop Rich into

exile in France, where Richard nursed him in his final illness. After the Archbishop's death, Richard moved to the Dominican house at Orleans for further study and teaching. He was ordained priest in 1243.



He then returned to England, and was elected Bishop of Chichester in 1244. King Henry opposed the election, confiscated all the revenues of the diocese, and even locked Richard out of the episcopal dwelling. Richard was given lodging by a priest, Simon of Tarring. During these years he functioned as a missionary bishop, traveling about the diocese on foot, visiting fishermen and farmers, holding synods with great difficulty, and endeavoring to establish order. Threatened by the Pope, Henry finally acknowledged Richard as Bishop in 1246.

For eight years, he served his diocese as preacher, confessor, teacher, and counselor. While campaigning in 1253, for a new crusade against the Saracens, he contracted a fatal fever. Nine years after his death, he was canonized. His best remembered words are:

Dear Lord, of thee three things I pray: To see thee more clearly, Love thee more dearly, Follow thee more nearly.

Together we pray: We thank thee, Lord God, for all the benefits thou hast given us in thy Son Jesus Christ, our most merciful Redeemer, Friend, and Brother, and for all the pains and insults he has borne for us; and we pray that, following the example of thy saintly bishop Richard of Chichester, we may see Christ more clearly, love him more dearly, and follow him more nearly; who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.


