Theologians Corner



KATERI TEKAKWITHA Prophetic Witness, 1680

Tekakwitha, "She who bumps into things," was born in the Mohawk village of Ossernon in upstate New York around 1656. Her childhood and adolescence were marked by hardship. A smallpox epidemic, which claimed the lives of her parents and younger brother, also scarred her face and severely impaired her vision. Her aunt and uncle, as adoptive parents, attempted to pressure her to marry beginning at age 11, but she resisted every attempt.

Moved by the preaching of Jesuit missionaries, Tekakwitha followed in the path of her late mother and converted to Christianity. She was baptized on Easter Sunday, 1676, at 19 years of age. As part of her conversion, she took the name Kateri, in honor of Catherine of Siena. Kateri Tekakwitha devoted her life to

chastity, pledging to marry only Jesus Christ, and asking the Virgin Mary to accept her as a daughter.

Her piety was mocked and derided by her fellow villagers, some of whom threatened her life. She fled to a village south of Montreal, where with her friend Marie-Therese, she attempted to begin a monastic community of indigenous women. They were dissuaded by the local priests, who believed they did not have enough experience to begin such a community. Kateri therefore accepted an "ordinary" life of chastity and good works among the people, especially the elderly and sick.


At age 24, she succumbed to a serious illness. Tradition accords her final words as being "Jesus, I love you," as she entered eternal life on Holy Wednesday, 1680. Following her death, it was reported that her body softened and her face took on the appearance of a child, even including a smile. The pockmarks of her childhood smallpox faded, and her skin became smooth. Pilgrimages were made to her grave as early as 1684.

Kateri Tekakwitha is known as the Lily of the Mohawks, and was the first Native American to be canonized in the Roman Catholic Church, where she is considered the patron of ecology and the environment, as well as persons in exile.

Together we pray: Almighty and everliving God, who didst open the heart of Kateri Tekakwitha, Lily of the Mohawk, to receive the Good News of Jesus Christ, and to devote her life to thy service: grant us the same zeal of devotion to persevere in faith through the trials.






News From Thailand Joanne Green

The bad news is that air pollution has been horrible. (Below is copied from a website we refer to often.) The good news is that we have air purifiers in our house and are going to Chiang Mai tomorrow for our organization's conference. Air quality in Chiang Mai is 200 as compared to here. For reference, below 50

is healthy, below 100 is acceptable, above 100 begins to be concerning for health. A wind blew through yesterday that cleared the air quite a bit (down to 190 yesterday!). We were grateful for that. Our home church has been praying. We would appreciate your prayer, too, for rain and wind.



A couple of days ago Mae Sai happened to be ranked #1 as the most polluted city in the world at that real-time moment.

On the good news side is that Roger returned from the nearby country. The training for six church leaders went well. He presented and then provided many practice times for exegesis for lay leaders, storying, how to lead a discussion, family devotions, blessing your children and digital resources. He also had several meetings with people leading Bible translation projects. Thank you very much for praying for him!

The interns (in the attached photo) were a huge help to me. They looked at my worldview research. We talked through our observations about the responses and what new questions would be good. We also talked through proposals that could be presented to the pastor. It was good to have the help in thinking through everything.

We're making progress on the May 5 to 6 parents/sons retreat (new name). Pastor Bee had more suggestions to make. The Thai moms and I are still working on details and praying a lot. Please continue to ask God for good health for all, building a Biblical foundation for the boys' future roles and much encouragement to the parents and sons.

I'm especially happy that I made my first presentation on Zoom to a non-Christian Japanese lady regarding an introduction to person-centered thinking. Her daughter has an intellectual disability and is also deaf. A Japanese Christian friend interpreted for me. The session went well. I am encouraged that this planning process will be helpful for Japanese families who have a family member with intellectual disabilities.

The sometimes symptom-less ways that bad air affects our bodies reminds me of how sin affects us. We may not notice the bad effects of sin right away. Neverthless, sin causes much damage. The challenge is to communicate in a way that the danger will be well understood, and people will make life changes to address the hazard. The blood of Jesus cleanses us more than air purifiers can cleanse the air.


