St. Benedict's Rule

Greetings from Schuyler, Nebraska.

It is another beautiful morning here at St. Benedict's Retreat Center. This is massive retreat house with over eighty guests at the moment: everybody from quilters to

iconographers. There is always worship going on and you can smell the incense from where you sit in class. This is the beginning of day three and our workshop has been putting in some long days. Teresa asked me the other night, "Did you expect thirteen-hour days?" I didn't, but that's okay. The process is intense and that is the way it was advertised. In a few moments we will begin again and after a rest I'm ready.

The phrase, "always begin again" is a part of the title of a book about the Benedictine way of life. Based off St. Benedict's Rule,



always begin again is a principle of encouragement not just simply an invitation to start over. The phrase assumes that some learning has happened and that the next time around will lead one to encounter new insights as they move closer to the center of life, which is God. The way one begins again - starts with practice.

As we prepare to begin again, you'll notice that there are several ways in which you can participate in our liturgical life this year. I hope that throughout the next few weeks you would allow yourself some time to meditate on if this is the year for you to begin again. Perhaps you have been thinking about choir, meditation, or ministering to our young children. These practices are deeply spiritual, and it is my constant prayer that through your discipline of prayer you hear the voice of God that is calling you to begin again.

In hope of that...

Together we pray: O God, we ask you to send your Holy Angels to bless and guide us in our contemplation of ministry this year so that only your will be done. We humbly ask this prayer of thanks and hope through your only Son, Jesus Christ; who along with You and the Holy Spirit reign as One true God. Amen.


May the ministry you practice this year bless the Lord,

Theologian's Corner:



Thomas Gallaudet, 1902, with Henry Winter Syle, 1890

Ministry to the deaf in The Episcopal Church begins with Thomas Gallaudet and his protégé, Henry Winter Syle. Without Gallaudet's genius and zeal for the spiritual well-being of deaf persons, it is improbable that a history of ministry to the deaf in The Episcopal Church could be written. He has been called "The Apostle to the Deaf."


Gallaudet was born June 3, 1822, in Hartford, Connecticut, the eldest son of Thomas Hopkins Gallaudet, founder of the West Hartford School for the Deaf, whose wife, Sophia, was a deaf-mute.

After graduating from Trinity College in Hartford, Thomas announced his intention of being confirmed and becoming a priest in The Episcopal Church. His father prevailed upon him to postpone a final decision, and to accept a teaching position in the New York Institution for Deaf-Mutes. There he met and married Elizabeth Budd,

a deaf-mute. Gallaudet was ordained deacon in 1850 and served his diaconate at St. Stephen's Church, where he established a Bible class for deaf persons.

Ordained a priest in 1851, Gallaudet became Assistant Rector at St. Ann's Church, where he conceived a plan for establishing a church that would be a spiritual home for deaf people. This became a reality the following year, with the founding of St. Ann's Church for Deaf-Mutes. The congregation was able to purchase a church building in 1859, and it became a center for

missionary work to the deaf continuing into its merger with the parish of Calvary-St. George in 1976. As a result of this ministry, mission congregations were established in many cities. Gallaudet died on August 27, 1902.



One fruit of Gallaudet's ministry was Henry Winter Syle, who had lost his hearing as the result of scarlet fever. Educated at Trinity College, Hartford; St. John's College, Cambridge, England; and Yale; Syle was a brilliant student, who persisted in his determination to obtain an education, despite his handicap and fragile health. He was encouraged by Gallaudet to seek Holy Orders, and, having moved to Philadelphia,

was supported by Bishop Stevens, against the opposition of many who believed that the impairment of one of the senses was an impediment to ordination. Syle was ordained in 1876, the first deaf person to receive Holy Orders in this Church. In 1888, he built All Souls Church for the Deaf in Philadelphia, the first Episcopal church constructed especially for deaf persons. He died on January 6, 1890.

Together we pray: O Loving God, whose will it is that everyone shouldst come to thee and be saved: We bless thy holy Name for thy servants Thomas Gallaudet and Henry Winter Syle, and we pray that thou wilt continually move thy Church to respond in love to the needs of all people; through Jesus Christ, who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.






Pub Theology is Thursday, August 31st, 6:30pm at Tumbleweed's. Let's all gather and start the fall season together discussing all things theological!

Here at St. Luke's, we are fortunate to have an impactful children's formation program – Godly Play!

Here are some things you might be wondering about Godly Play:

· I wonder what Godly Play is...

Godly Play is a way for children to make meaning through story, wonder, and play. A storyteller will share a Bible story with the children, and then they are invited to wonder about how they personally relate to God through that story.

· I wonder when Godly Play will start up again...

On September 10th, we will offer our first Godly Play story of the program year.

· I wonder when the children will meet for Godly Play...

The children will go upstairs to the Godly Play room after the reading of the Gospel at the 10:30 service. They will return to church during the Passing of the Peace. We value the presence of children in our community and in worship, so we want to be sure that they are there to worship with the rest of the congregation during most of the service on Sundays.

· I wonder what ages are welcome at Godly Play...




