Re-Keying the Church

Greetings beloved.

As you've probably heard we are rekeying the church this week. This project has been in the queue for over a year. And here is why:

The Episcopal Church has always strived to be a safe place for all to gather, to learn, and to worship. To that end, for decades we have had

programs in place to set standards and provide education for protecting the vulnerable among us. As with all things, these programs must be reviewed and improved periodically. General Convention in 2015 called for this review, the result of which was a set of Model Policies and associated training to be enacted church wide. Diocesan Council approved the new Safe Church policies for the Episcopal Diocese of Oklahoma in November of 2022.

These new policies replace outdated policies and training from the early 2000's. These newer policies call for a higher level of accountability in our ministries, parishes, and in the diocese. With them, we will be protecting a greater range of people including both children and adults to keep those who are most vulnerable safe from harm.

Guarding them is work and requires attention to detail. An increase in accountability, by necessity, brings additional responsibility to maintain accurate and timely reports as well as to implement and follow the policies and procedures. We should remember that we are not being penalized for what has been done in the past, we simply seek improvement.

While implementation may at first feel complicated and onerous, by our Baptismal Covenant we are called to strive for justice and peace. In this case, that means to strive to improve our protection of the vulnerable from "good" to better - even to best practices.

St. Luke's Episcopal Church considers the safety of its employees, parishioners, volunteers, guests, and property to be of paramount importance and believes that key control is a major component of a comprehensive security program. It is the responsibility of each key holder to ensure procedures are followed to maintain the security and safety of everyone at St. Luke's.

Moving forward with your understanding. We thank-you for your patience.

Theologian's Corner: David Pendleton Oakerhater

Deacon and Missionary, 1931

"God's warrior" is an epithet by which David Pendleton Oakerhater is known among the Cheyenne Indians of Oklahoma. The title is an apt one, for this apostle of Christ to the Cheyenne was originally a soldier who fought against the United States government with warriors of other tribes in the disputes over Indian land rights. Born circa 1851, by the late 1860s Oakerhater had distinguished himself for bravery

and leadership as an officer in an elite corps of Cheyenne fighters. In 1875, after a year of minor uprisings and threats of major violence, he and twenty-seven other warrior leaders were taken prisoner by the U.S. Army, charged with inciting rebellion, and sent to a disused military prison in Florida.

Under the influence of a concerned Army captain, who sought to educate the prisoners, Oakerhater and his companions learned English, gave art and archery lessons to the area's many visitors, and had their

first encounter with the Christian faith. The captain's example, and that of other concerned Christians from as far away as New York, had their effect on the young warrior. He was moved to answer the call to transform his leadership in war into a lifelong ministry of peace.

With sponsorship from the Diocese of Central New York and financial help from a Mrs. Pendleton of Cincinnati, he and three other prisoners went north to study for the ministry. At his baptism in Syracuse in 1878, he took the name David Pendleton Oakerhater, in honor of his benefactress.

Soon after his ordination to the diaconate in 1881, Oakerhater returned to Oklahoma. There, he was instrumental in founding and operating schools and missions, through great personal sacrifice and often in the face of apathy from the Church hierarchy and resistance from the government. He continued his ministry of service, education, and pastoral care among his people until his death on August 31, 1931.

Half a century before, the young deacon had told his people: "You all know me. You remember when I led you out to war I went first, and what I told you was true. Now I have been away to the East and I have learned about another captain, the Lord Jesus Christ, and he is my leader. He goes first, and all he tells me is true. I come back to my people to tell you to go with me now in this new road, a war that makes all for peace."

O God of unsearchable wisdom and mercy, thou didst choose a captive warrior, David Oakerhater, to be thy servant, and didst send him to be a missionary to his own people and to execute the office of deacon among them: Liberate us, who commemorate him today, from bondage to self, and empower us for service to thee and to the neighbors thou hast given us; through Jesus Christ, the captain of our salvation; who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God for ever and ever. Amen.

Godly Play!!!

Here at St. Luke's, we are fortunate to have an impactful children's formation program – Godly Play!

Here are some things you might be wondering about Godly Play:

· I wonder what Godly Play is...

Godly Play is a way for children to make meaning through story, wonder, and play. A storyteller will share a Bible story with the children, and then they are invited to wonder about how they personally relate to God through that story.

· I wonder when Godly Play will start up again...

On September 10th, we will offer our first Godly Play story of the program year.

· I wonder when the children will meet for Godly Play...

The children will go upstairs to the Godly Play room after the reading of the Gospel at the 10:30 service. They will return to church during the Passing of the Peace. We value the presence of children in our community and in worship, so we want to be sure that they are there to worship with the rest of the congregation during most of the service on Sundays.

just joined her troop," Josie said. Amongst her rows of badges, she's saved a spot on her vest for the highest Girl Scout honor: the Gold award. "It's 80 hours of work, and anything community service," said Josie. Because she's no stranger to serving her community, Josie came up with the perfect idea to earn the award and help out even more. She noted all the food in the pantry at the Mary Martha Outreach and created a 40-page recipe book incorporating the items. "Talked about Mary Martha, and I had already volunteered for Mary Martha, so I was like 'yeah, I'll help them and make a cookbook," said Josie. Misty Wishall is the director of Mary Martha Outreach and says the pantry is a very helpful resource for the community.
