Jackson

I think the trip to Jackson, MS may end up being a seminal event in the life of our parish. It certainly will be for me. As you may recall the trip to Jackson was to learn about a program called, "Walking the Mourner's Path." What interested us about taking this trip was that the Path had been described as different from other grief programs, being founded on the profound question of "Where is God in my pain?" As a ministry that is unapologetically Christian, grounded in prayer, and intentionally

focused on that question, the Path turned out to be for us the real deal.

In a nutshell the program consists of the following:

8 Weekly Small Group Workshops.
Spiritually Directed.
Guided by Trained Facilitators and Clergy.
Participant Workbook provides a framework for each workshop.

Therapist Margot Thibodeau reflects on the program thus, "As a therapist I am so impressed by the simplicity and the complete focus on the group doing the work. I often use to tell "young" therapists that if as a therapist or a group facilitator you're working hard, then the clients probably are not." And I can tell you that the group really does do the work.

Which reminds me of what Gary Vogel once said, "that together we can do what I cannot do alone." That is so true. Along with the concept of simplicity and group focus as norms, the program offers one the space where all the frill is removed so as to truly allow participants to get down to the real work together – and it is powerful work.

One thing about the Path is that though program is 8 weeks long, nowhere in the literature does it say that one who walks it will be completely healed after having taken it. I would be highly skeptical of a program that made such a claim. Rather, last weekend we encountered folks who had walked the Path before - as they continue to move towards healing – for grief work in some ways is a part of life's work. And, if it's life's work then it is our work.

In light of that, we plan on hosting a workshop at St. Luke's after the first of the year. Between now and then, our team is going to take a deep dive into the workshops, concentrate on deepening our practice as facilitators, and then regroup in January to talk about logistics.

At the earliest you'll see the program pop up in February.

If this kind of group speaks to you, I hope you will begin to pray about whether or not you might consider the Path. This is holy, sacred, and vulnerable work and because of that, your facilitators must walk the Path first - so that when it is your time the support you need will be there.

Theologians Corner: Remigius Bishop of Rheims, c. 530

Remigius, also known as Remi, one of the patron saints of France, was born about 438, the son of the Count of Laon. At the age of twenty two he became Bishop of Rheims.

Noted for his learning and holiness of life, Remigius is chiefly remembered because he converted and baptized King Clovis of the Franks on Christmas Day, 496. This event changed the religious history of Europe. Clovis, by becoming Catholic instead of Arian, as were most of the Germanic people of the time, was able to unite the Gallo-Roman population and their Christian leaders behind his expanding hegemony over the Germanic rulers of the West

and to liberate Gaul from Roman domination. His conversion also made possible the cooperation the Franks gave later to Pope Gregory the Great in his evangelistic efforts for the English.

Certainly, Clovis' motives in accepting Catholic Christianity were mixed, but there is no doubt of the sincerity of his decision, nor of the important role of Remigius in bringing it to pass. When Clovis was baptized, together with 3,000 of his followers, Remigius gave him the well-known charge, "Worship what you have burned, and burn what you have worshiped."

The feast of Remigius is observed at Rheims on January 13, possibly the date of his death. The later date of October 1 is derived from the translation of his relics to a new abbey church by Pope Leo IX in 1049.

Together we pray: O God, who by the teaching of thy faithful servant and bishop Remigius didst turn the nation of the Franks from vain idolatry to the worship of thee, the true and living God, in the fullness of the catholic faith: Grant that we who glory in the name of Christian may show forth our faith in worthy deeds; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

When my California friend Ted died three years ago in the U.S., I (Joanne) really missed him. Ted shared with me how I could pray for his loved ones, and he took time to pray for my loved ones, too. He was so enthusiastic about praying for those he cared about. After he died, though, I still had the list of all the people he had been praying for. One person in particular stood out. I contacted her to give her my condolences. I still pray for her, asking God to open ways for her to know Him. I marveled at how Ted had been able to pass on his concern for his family and friends to me before he died. Through me, the heart of Ted reaches beyond his grave.

I was eager to see what more God would do through intentional prayers. When Roger and I first arrived in this Thailand town, I went to the local market and asked God which vendor would be open to Good News. As I walked down the row of stalls, I looked at people's faces. Wanting to buy bananas, I chose one woman to buy bananas from. That's how it began. After that I always went to *Ula to buy bananas.

Over the months I asked God to open Ula's heart. One day Ula's stall was empty and stayed empty for a couple of months. Finally, I was able to find a friend of Ula's. Ula's friend told me Ula had cancer and was receiving chemo.

I went to visit Ula at her home (using the Thai language, because she doesn't speak English). Ula showed me photos of how beautiful she was when she was young. Her parents had forced her into a marriage with a man who was not her choice. Only after her daughter was born did she find out that he had another wife and three sons. Ula and her husband separated.

Each time I visited Ula, I ended the time with prayer. A pastor from a local church was able to visit Ula with me on one visit. He shared Good News with her and prayed.

Ula has now been receiving cancer treatment for about 15 months. She will find out next month if the tumor can be operated on. Please ask God to bring healing and comfort to Ula in this journey of cancer treatment and financial provision for Ula and her daughter. In addition, please ask God to help me to embody Good News as one person who visits her regularly.

I have a new prayer partner in this Thailand town. Her name is Noy. I did not know her well at first. Now we are comfortable with each other (and using the Thai language, because she doesn't speak English). For months now we have been asking God to help us to love our loved ones well. Noy has become someone who is precious to me. I have joined her in praying for her loved ones, and she has joined me in praying for my loved ones.

As we together ask God to open the hearts of our loved ones, I am confident our care and concern will reach beyond our graves. I am praising God that I learned back in 2020 how to be intentional in prayer and with love.






