

# Y.D. Celebrates 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Friendsgiving

Many things were born during the COVID-19 Pandemic. Among them was the profound awareness of just how much we missed each other. Do you remember that? I remember when the restrictions were easing up a bit, reunions were all the rage - even if those reunions needed to be held outside with smaller guest lists. The important thing was that people were getting together again. Other than the Men's Group, I think one of the first groups to meet together again as restrictions were easing was Y.D.

"Friendsgiving" was officially added to the dictionary in 2020 with roots that go back as far as 2007. Most folks credit the sitcom "Friends" as the inspiration for the day that celebrates Thanksgiving with friends, sometimes, in lieu of having Thanksgiving with family. In our case, however, the feast is in addition to – for good reason. Why have one Thanksgiving when you can have two?

There is no "official" date for Friendsgiving, however, at St. Luke's Y.D. has set the date on the Wednesday a week prior to Thanksgiving itself. Done pot-luck style, most of the traditional fixings are present. The addition of parents to the evening's frivolity is most welcome, but the best - is in seeing folks come together just to eat and enjoy one another's company.

Coming together (gathering) essentially is one of the most fundamental practices of the Christian life. We are to be a community in every way that we can. And we are to be this community not just one day in seven but over time, seven whole days in seven - through the practices of worship, fellowship, and witness. The things that bind these three practices together are of course our relationships which you'll recall is a form of stewardship. The currency of relationship is increased when we take time to just be with one another outside the well-established domains of church life. Many of the ministries of St. Luke's are figuring that out just as Y.D. has done.

I am convinced that the more we find ways to be together the easier it will be to call upon each other when we need each other. Someone once said, "alone we can do so little; together, we can do so much." That is true, whether we offer our witness as Christians in the world or as members of a church that makes it a priority to do life together. For there is wisdom in understanding that friends are the family we choose and that the only way to have friends is to be one. Peace, Nick+



## Theologian's Corner Margaret Queen of Scotland, 1093

Shakespeare made familiar the names of Macbeth and Macduff, Duncan, and Malcolm; but it is not always remembered that Malcolm married an English princess, Margaret, about 1070.

With considerable zeal, Margaret sought to change what she considered to be old-fashioned and careless practices among the Scottish clergy. She insisted that the observance of Lent, for example, was to begin on Ash Wednesday, rather than on the following Monday, and that the Mass should be celebrated according to the accepted Roman rite of the Church, and not in barbarous form and language. The Lord's Day was to be a day when, she said, "we apply ourselves only to prayers." She argued vigorously, though not always with success, against the exaggerated sense of unworthiness that made many of the pious

Scots unwilling to receive Communion regularly.

Margaret's energies were not limited to reformation of formal Church practices. She encouraged the founding of schools, hospitals, and orphanages, and used her influence with King Malcolm to help her improve the quality of life among the isolated Scottish clans. Together, Margaret and her husband rebuilt the monastery of Iona and founded Dunfermline Abbey, under the direction of Benedictine monks.

In addition to her zeal for Church and people, Margaret was a conscientious wife and the mother of eight children. Malcolm, a strong-willed man, came to trust her judgment even in matters of State. She saw also to the spiritual welfare of her large household, providing servants with opportunity for regular worship and prayer.

Margaret was not as successful as she wished to be in creating greater unity in faith and works between her own native England and the Scots. She was unable, for example, to bring an end to the bloody warfare among the highland clans, and, after her death in 1093, there was a brief return to the earlier isolation of Scotland from

England. Nevertheless, her work among the people and her reforms in the Church made her Scotland's most beloved saint. She died on November 16, 1093, and was buried at Dunfermline Abbey.

Together we pray: O God, who didst call thy servant Margaret to an earthly throne that she might advance thy heavenly kingdom, and gave her zeal for thy Church and love for thy people: Mercifully grant that we, who commemorate her this day, may be fruitful in good works and attain to the glorious crown of thy saints; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. 

YD made dozens of Christmas cards for delivery to residents of Green Country Village in December. Special thanks to Kate Roper for bringing all the creative supplies.
















### Mark and Mary Jo Super-Sprucers!

Osage. Until recently, the lower stucco portion of the home was a cracked and soiled white that distracted from this otherwise handsome structure, dating back to the 1920s. After the stucco was repaired, Mark and Mary Jo went to work and white-primed the entire surface (there's a lot of it counting the inside of two porches). Now they're well into applying the finish coat, a restful blue-gray. Mark handles the cut-in brush work while Mary Jo follows with the paint roller.
