

Back to School!

On August 7th the Bartlesville Public Schools Foundation hosted the (2024-2025) State of the Schools Luncheon in the Bartlesville High School Commons. BPS Child Nutrition catered the luncheon, providing attendees with several delicious lunch options to choose from this year. If this is what is offered to our kids on a daily basis, I might just head over to the high school for lunch more often! Both Blair Ellis and Chuck McCauley presented timely and pertinent information regarding everything from instructional philosophy and policy to

construction timetables for some of our elementary schools. As was the case last year, I find that every time I leave this event I feel as though I am well-informed, and that Bartlesville Public Schools has some tremendous leadership in place as well as dedicated servant leaders who want nothing but the best for our city's children.

The sheer amount of information that is presented at the State of the Schools luncheon will not leave one wanting. I assure you that enough information is presented in under an hour that it is just shy of what some might consider something akin to being soaked by a fire hose. Nevertheless, Superintendent McCauley did something I appreciated this year by directly focusing some time at the beginning of the event to address the elephant in the room; namely State Superintendent Ryan Walters' mandate for specific curriculum that requires schools to incorporate the Bible into classroom lessons. I hadn't expected that, but remained interested in hearing about the position that the district was taking. McCauley's response was that BPS will continue to abide by a policy our local school board had adopted in 2008, entitled "Religion in Schools."

Superintendent McCauley was also upfront about the shortage of teachers some districts are experiencing across the State. He reported that in Tulsa Public Schools alone, there are currently one hundred and thirty vacancies. To proactively engage that trend, BPS holds job fairs each semester that seek qualified teachers who are looking for employment in one of the most highly respected school districts in the State.

I so appreciate the many ways our educators continue to go above and beyond the call of duty and do so much with so little. It's not lost on me that as a denomination, we may look past the fact that

to be a practicing Episcopalian one needs to be highly literate and so, behind each liturgy, behind each lesson, behind each prayer there has been a teacher that has helped us to understand the building blocks that make up the vocabulary of our faith. And as committed as they remain, we shall remain committed to them also by praying for them during the daily office here at St. Lukes. That book is entitled, "The Anxious Generation: How the Great Rewiring of Childhood is Causing an Epidemic of Mental Illness" by Jonathan Haidt. As parents who are seeing that "rewiring" firsthand, Teresa and I are already listening to the book on Audible. My initial thoughts are that at the very least, this book is shaping up to provide the reader not only context but also it strives to offer some vital information about the social milieu of generation alpha. As a church who is intentional about looking to the future, I think this book is well worth our time.

While I was leaving, I walked past the big Bruin and thought about what a formidable creature the bear is – how protective it can be of its cubs and how it stands tall to meet the challenges it faces. I thought about that passage in Isaiah, "And they that shall be of thee shall build the old waste places: thou shalt raise up the foundations of many generations; and thou shalt be called, Repairers of the breach, Restorers of paths to dwell in" (Isa. 58:12). I thought about our teachers and how God might be leading me to pray for them and support them more faithfully this year. They have mighty work before them in shaping the future one day at a time – one child at a time. God bless them all.

News from the Greens

Hi friends,

I walked slowly home from my Thai class last week. The weeklong rains made the road slippery, so I watched my step. Though I hadn't seen the sun for a week, the warmth of my time with my Thai tutor stayed with me. When I have the

opportunity to see something that God is doing, it is such a great privilege. My Thai tutor had asked to study the book of Hebrews together, because she found it difficult to understand. In each chapter, she had questions. Yesterday as we looked at Hebrews 8, she asked, "Why did we need a new covenant and a new priest?" I pointed her back to Hebrews 8:9-10, which talks about how God's people had not lived up to their part of God's covenant with them. So God decided He had to do everything. Even though this was actually part of His plan from the beginning of creation, He first took His people through the process of the old covenant. This would help God's people to understand what His fulfillment in Jesus would mean.

Then she asked, "How does God put His laws in our minds and write them on our hearts?" (from Hebrews 8:10, which refers to Jeremiah 31:33) For that question, I had to close my eyes and think about how to answer. I pointed her to Joel 2:28 (referred to by Peter in Acts 2:17), which talks about God pouring out His Spirit. Then we read together 2 Corinthians 3:3 "You show that you are a letter from Christ, the result of our ministry, written not with ink but with the Spirit of the living God, not on tablets of stone but on tablets of human hearts." She was very excited to see this verse's connection to Hebrews 8. Praise God for my Thai tutor getting excited when she learns more about Him in His Word.

Meanwhile, Roger last week finished managing the Christian radio programming workshop for Christian leaders from two language groups in a nearby country. FEBC sent local representatives to teach about radio program content and technology. Peter from the Timak language group and his daughter attended the workshop. They completed their first 15-minute radio program and envision

making 70 more programs to make enough programs for six months. Thank you for praying for this Christian radio programming workshop.

I'm continuing planning for four after-church mother/daughter sessions for a church in Chiang Mai. Those sessions will begin in September. Please ask God to open the way with good health and open schedules as I meet with three mothers and their daughters. September is also when I will begin supervising two Scripture engagement interns in a research project in a local church. One intern is from Singapore, and one is from Hong Kong. Praise God for the desire of these two young women to serve God through research and building relationships. We are currently meeting online to learn research skills from our anthropology coordinators. I am enjoying this opportunity to learn more! Please ask God to encourage these two young women and equip them well for their future ministry.

We are excited to be with Esther and Noah as they get married on Aug. 25! Please ask God to give them a beautiful start to their marriage.

Lastly, two days ago I slipped and fell flat on my back. I was sore the first day but was better the second day. I am thanking God for protection from a more serious injury.




