



September 11, 2024

On our recent trip to New York, the Young Disciples made a trip to the 9/11 memorial – ground zero. As you know, the memorial features a cavernous water feature. That morning there were several tour groups around us, so it was easy to hear some of the facts that the guides were offering to their groups. When I heard the words, "This is anything but a fountain," I took notice.

The guide continued, "The focal points of the Memorial are two pools, that are each nearly an acre in size. They sit in what are the footprints of the former North and South Towers. The pools are the largest manmade waterfalls in North America, each descending 30 feet into a square basin that you can see below. From there, the water in each pool drops another 20 feet and disappears into a smaller, central void.

According to the architect, Michael Arad, the pools represent "absence made visible." Although water flows into the voids, they can never be filled." All around us the people fell silent. Someone noticed flowers by particular names and asked about them. "The flowers indicate birthdays." The flowers were white.

Twenty-three years ago the world changed, and the epicenter of that change was in New York. Decades of war followed. The Presiding Bishop at the time Frank Griswold, was asked to write a prayer, one that could be used in observances of the anniversary of September 11, 2001, perhaps at the conclusion of the Prayers of the People. We return to it this week.

He wrote:

God the compassionate one, whose loving care extends to all the world, we remember this day your children of many nations and many faiths whose lives were cut short by the fierce flames of anger and hatred. Console those who continue to suffer and grieve, and give them comfort and hope as

they look to the future. Out of what we have endured, give us the grace to examine our relationships with those who perceive us as the enemy, and show our leaders the way to use our power to serve the good of all for the healing of the nations. This we ask through Jesus Christ our Lord who, in reconciling love, was lifted up from the earth that he might draw all things to himself. Amen.

As we remember this day may Bishop Griswold's words awaken in us the memory of that day and the years that followed. May we, upon reflection emerge with new perspective and continue the often arduous work of peacemaking in our own way wherever that may be. May we do this work in the name of Christ.



Theologian's Corner

The Exultation of the Holy Cross September 14th



The Story of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross

Early in the fourth century, Saint Helena, mother of the Roman Emperor Constantine, went to Jerusalem in search of the holy places of Christ's life. She razed the second-century Temple of Aphrodite, which tradition held was built over the Savior's tomb, and her son built the Basilica of the Holy Sepulcher on that spot. During the excavation, workers found three crosses. Legend has it that the one on which Jesus died was identified when its touch healed a dying woman.

The cross immediately became an object of veneration. At a Good Friday celebration in Jerusalem toward the end of the fourth century, according to an eyewitness, the wood was taken out of its silver container and placed on a table together with the inscription Pilate ordered placed above Jesus' head: Then "all the people pass through one by one; all of them bow down, touching the cross and the inscription, first with their foreheads, then with their eyes; and, after kissing the cross, they move on."

To this day, the Eastern Churches, Catholic and Orthodox alike, celebrate the Exaltation of the Holy Cross on the September anniversary of the basilica's dedication. The feast entered the Western calendar in the seventh century after Emperor Heraclius recovered the cross from the Persians, who had carried it off in 614, 15 years earlier. According to the story, the emperor

intended to carry the cross back into Jerusalem himself, but was unable to move forward until he took off his imperial garb and became a barefoot pilgrim.

In the Epsicopal Church we observe this Feast on Sept. 14. The collect for Holy Cross Day recalls that Christ "was lifted high upon the cross that he might draw the whole world unto himself," and prays that "we, who glory in the mystery of our redemption, may have grace to take up our cross and follow him" (BCP, p. 192). The themes of Holy Cross Day are powerfully expressed by the hymn "Lift high the cross" (Hymn 473).

As alluded to above, this feast is known as "The Exaltation of the Holy Cross" in the eastern church and in missals and sacramentaries of the western church, and it is known as "The Triumph of the Cross" in the Roman Catholic Church. It was one of the 12 great feasts in the Byzantine liturgy. The 1979 BCP is the first American Prayer Book to include Holy Cross Day so it may be new to some of you.

Together let us pray: Almighty God, whose Son our Savior Jesus Christ was lifted high upon the cross that he might draw the whole world unto himself: Mercifully grant that we, who glory in the mystery of our redemption, may have grace to take up our cross and follow him; who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, in glory everlasting. Amen.



News from the Greens:

Dear praying friends,

Thank you for standing with Roger and me as we provide Scripture engagement planning and tools



for communities in 15 Bible translation projects in a nearby country. Roger continues with organizing Scripture recordings, devices and training for each language team. We value your prayers, too, for those who are having to leave their homes in order to find safety. Our hearts go out to them. Please ask God to help them reach their destinations and start a new life there. So much needs to get organized in the new places, especially for school-age children. Another prayer request is Sunday, Sept. 15, when I'll lead the first of four after-church sessions for four Thai mothers and their daughters. Through discussing the book of Ruth, Psalm 63:1-5, the Tabernacle, Ephesians 5:21-32, 1 Corinthians 7:32-38, Genesis 2:15-25, and Song of Songs 2, I assist mothers and daughters to feel more comfortable talking with each other about topics that might formerly have felt taboo. We've had good results from Mother/Daughter events in the past. I yearn for the Lord's enabling and blessing. May His Holy Spirit bring ease and harmony to these sessions, open the hearts of the mothers and daughters and make them strong in who they are in Christ in the context of family and either singleness or marriage.

Then on Monday, Sept. 16, Roger and other colleagues will help me lead a week-long Scripture engagement orientation for two interns who will be doing research at a local church. The purpose of the research is to understand which Scripture engagement tool would be most appreciated by the church members. The orientation includes introductions to anthropology research, EthnoArts, spiritual formation, trauma healing, group Bible listening, Discovery Bible Study, Bible storying, participatory methods, praying for loved ones who don't yet know Jesus, family ministries, and a practice interview session through an interpreter. There are a lot of moving parts to this orientation, so please ask God for His grace that the interns will receive a good overall picture of the variety of possibilities for experiencing the richness of God's Word.

Thank you for praying for a beautiful beginning to Esther and Noah's marriage! The wedding was full of precious moments of celebrating. We enjoyed the family time (including time with Noah's family) and getting to know Esther's and Noah's friends better. In the wedding ceremony, we all loudly affirmed that we would support Esther and Noah in their marriage. We thank God we could be there. Now, we are continuing to ask God to guide Esther and Noah and lead them ever closer to Him and to each other in their first year of marriage.

Since there has been daily rain for months, Roger and I have been doing mold prevention with silica gel packs and also doing clean-up (or throw-out) for things we either forgot to mold-proof or didn't know to mold-proof. A couple of days ago the water company turned off our house water for the whole day. Ironic, right? So, our daily life has its own challenges.


CONCERN NEEDS
