

Those Who Sing Pray Twice

The phrase "Those who sing, pray twice," attributed to St. Augustine, holds deep meaning for anyone involved in church music. I have often reflected on this statement, and its truth becomes more evident as the words of hymns become more alive with each song I sing in worship. As such, music in the context of worship is not merely an embellishment to prayer; it is an integral and transformative part of it, heightening both personal devotion and communal

worship.

I think some of you may agree, that singing as a form of prayer has a unique power to reach the depths of the human soul. While spoken prayers engage our intellect and voice, music engages the heart in a way that is often indescribable. There is a certain mystery in how melodies can lift words beyond the ordinary, making them resonate more deeply with our emotions and spirit. When we sing while in worship, I feel as though we are offering something more than words though — in that it is a more heartfelt expression which transcends the limitations of language.

One of the most profound experiences I've had singing in church is witnessing how music brings the congregation together in prayer. Singing in unison creates a sense of unity that spoken words often cannot achieve. In those moments, it is as if our collective voices form a single prayer rising to God. Thus, the communal aspect of worship is enhanced when we sing, as we are not only individuals praying privately but also a body of believers praying together. In this way, music bridges the personal and the communal, allowing everyone to contribute to the shared prayer, regardless of musical ability.

Moreover, singing engages the entire person in prayer—mind, body, and spirit. When we sing, we are using our breath, our bodies, and our senses to communicate with God. The physical act of singing becomes a prayer in itself - a living testament to our faith. I find this especially moving during hymns or chants that have been sung for centuries, especially during the Eucharist. When we engage with these pieces, I feel connected to the many generations of Christians who have sung the

same prayers, offering the same praises and petitions to God as I hope you do. It's a reminder that our faith is not only individual but part of a rich and continuous tradition.

I'd like to thank Margaret and Janet for encouraging us all to use our voices in praise of God and for inviting us all into the rich musical tradition offered by Our Savior Lutheran Church. I believe for them that, "Those who sing, pray twice" encapsulates the power of music to create community. I have seen firsthand how music transforms ordinary moments into sacred encounters. Last Sunday was surely that.

Theologian's Corner



Theodore of Tarsus Archbishop of Canterbury

When the pagan Anglo-Saxons invaded England, they drove the native Celtic inhabitants north into Scotland and west into Ireland, Wales, and Cornwall. The Anglo-Saxons were subsequently converted to Christianity by Celtic missionaries from the north and west, and Roman and Gallic missionaries from the south and east. As a result, they ended up with two different "flavors" of Christianity. The difference was expressed mainly in the form of a disagreement about the proper method for calculating the date of Easter, a disagreement which we may suspect was a stand-in for other disagreements a little more difficult to articulate. In 663, a

council was called to settle the dispute, the Synod of Whitby. It decided in favor of the Roman or continental way of doing things.

Soon after, the Archbishop of Canterbury died, and the English elected a successor, Wighard, and sent him to Rome to be consecrated by the Pope. Wighard died in Rome before he could be consecrated, and the Pope (Vitalian) took it upon himself to choose a man to fill the vacancy. He consecrated Theodore of Tarsus (the native city of the Apostle Paul), a learned monk (not a priest) from the East then living in Rome, 65 years old. This surprising choice turned out to be a very good one. Theodore was (as Bede put it in his Ecclesiastical History) "the first archbishop whom all the English obeyed." Having made a tour of his charge, Theodore filled the vacant bishoprics and in 672 presided over the first council of the entire English Church, at Hertford. He established definite territorial boundaries for the various dioceses and founded new dioceses where needed. He found the Church of England an unorganized missionary body and left it a fully ordered province of the universal Church. The body of canon law drawn up under his supervision, and his structure of dioceses and parishes, survived the turmoil of the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries and are substantially intact today.

He founded a school at Canterbury that trained Christians from both the Celtic and the Roman traditions and did much to unite the two groups. The school was headed by Adrian, an abbot born in Africa but later resident in Italy, who had been the Pope's first choice for Archbishop, but who had refused and recommended Theodore instead. Adrian was learned in the Scriptures, a good administrator, and fluent in Latin and Greek. The school taught Bible, theology and sacred studies, Latin and Greek (Bede alleges that some of the students knew these languages as well as they knew English), poetry, astronomy, and calendar calculation (of some importance for political reasons, as stated above). Adrian died on the 9th of January 710. Theodore died the 19th of September 690 at 88 years old.

Together we pray: Almighty God, who didst give thy servant Theodore of Tarsus gifts of grace and wisdom to establish unity where there had been division and order where there had been chaos: Create in thy church, we pray thee, by the operation of the Holy Ghost, such godly union and concord that it may proclaim, both by word and example, the Gospel of the Prince of Peace; who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.


CONCERN NEEDS

Our walk in love began early in our relationship. Living in Utah, a Methodist and a Catholic in the land of the Latter-Day Saints, becoming Episcopalian only seemed logical.

When we moved to our current hometown, two things attracted us to the congregation that became our home: a stunning building designed by a world-renowned architect, a perfect setting for two young architects early in their career; and a Boy Scout trailer in the parking lot, perfect for an Eagle Scout from years earlier. Both our children were baptized within the walls of this church. Our son was confirmed and lived his scouting life through the troop chartered by the church. And our daughter has lived her entire spiritual life at our congregation. All of it has been a walk in love.

That walk, and the love that accompanies it, sustained us through a dark time that came suddenly and unexpectedly. In 2021 we tragically lost our 15-year-old son. Our priest brought calm in that devastating moment and was a constant reminder that God walks with us. From the congregation in the days and weeks that followed, meals were prepared, boxes of supplies arrived, there were calls, emails, texts, visits from our community of faith. We never doubted that God was with us, walking with us and, many days, carrying us. Our faith deepened. We were renewed in the unending love of God and upheld by a congregation of friends that gave of their time, their treasures, and their love with no expectation for repayment.

The stewardship of their lives, their walk with us in love, upheld us. Through them, we have experienced how much Christ has loved us. And because of that, we are to able give to others from all the gifts that God has given and to continue to walk in love. | \$\overline{\text{US.org}}\$
