



## Theologian's Corner



## Wilson Carlile Priest, Founder of the Church Army

You remember the song, "O When the Saints Go Marching In." You remember that one. I'll bet your humming it now.

In some ways it has fallen out of fashion. Get that! Fallen out of fashion in a religion that considers itself countercultural. Well, there is lots to talk about there. Maybe a future corner article. Nevertheless, "When the Saints Go Marching In" is no doubt on Carlile's greatest hits.

Wilson Carlile was born in 1847 in Brixton. He suffered from a spinal weakness all his life, which hampered his education. He entered his grandfather's business at the age of thirteen but soon moved on and learnt fluent French, which he used to good advantage in France trading in silk. He later learned

German and Italian to enhance his business, but was ruined in a slump in 1873.

After a serious illness, he began to take his religion more seriously and became confirmed in the Church of England. He acted as organist to Ira D Sankey, during the Moody and Sankey missions and in 1881 was ordained priest, serving his curacy at St Mary Abbots in Kensington, together with a dozen other curates. The lack of contact between the Church and the working classes was a cause of real concern to him and he began outdoor preaching. In 1882, he resigned his curacy and founded the Church Army, four years after the foundation of the Salvation Army. He continued to take part in its administration until a few weeks before his death on this day the 26<sup>th</sup> September in 1942.

Together we pray: God of boundless energy and light: We offer thanks for the courage and passion of Wilson Carlile who, after the example of thy Son, sought new ways to open thy Church to diverse leaders as beacons of the Gospel of Christ. Quicken our hearts to give bold witness to Jesus Christ; who with thee and the Holy Spirit, livest and reignest, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

### **Music Notes**

Fall is here and I can hardly believe that it's been over a year since I began the position of music director at St. Luke's. Thank you for giving me this amazing, God filled opportunity to help lead you in song each Sunday.

Some of you know the back story that led me here and some of you may not. When St. Luke's was searching for a music director, it didn't immediately occur to me that I might be the person for the job. With three children at home and working another job, I wasn't sure if the timing was right. Plus, I was a little scared to step into a position previously held by such a great musician who has been here for over 40 years! Oh yeah, and although I'm a classically trained pianist, I didn't know how to play the organ - a much more complex musical instrument. However, God kept tugging on my heart, and with God all things are possible.

This new journey hasn't been easy. Learning to play music with my feet has proven to be much more challenging and is taking longer than I anticipated. During Holy Week, I directed five services and two funerals and felt completely overwhelmed. I thought "What am I doing? I'm not even good at this!" Then I remembered that it's not about me. It's about praising The Lord. Whenever I needed encouragement, God sent one of you my way with support and love. Thank you, my friends!

There are many things about music at St. Luke's that brings me joy. I knew it would be great to learn new pieces and work with our wonderful choir, but I didn't expect that there would be so many more blessings in store. I've felt the Holy Spirit work through our lives at funerals, weddings, and celebrations. Sometimes when I'm practicing the organ, people come into the chapel to pray or the altar guild sets up for service. Other times, I'm there when nobody else is around and the peacefulness brings me closer to God.

In one of his recent sermons, Fr. Nick referenced this quote, "singing is like praying twice". I have never thought of it that way, have you? There are 52 Sundays in a year and with approximately 10 songs per service (including fraction anthems) that is 520 extra prayers! The next time you're in church, don't be shy. Sing out and make a joyful noise (prayer) to the Lord!



#### **Bereavement Committee**

The Bereavement Committee is a valuable ministry of St. Luke's and provides a reception for family and friends after the funeral or memorial

service of a loved one. The Committee is made up of 4 teams---4-6 women each. Teams rotate according to funeral schedules and provide-----Set Up, Food, and Drink. They serve with compassion and care to meet the requests of the family.

If you're unable to commit to a team, but would like to help, another option is to agree to provide a Food item to be served.

This ministry offers flexibility for its team members since funeral dates aren't usually scheduled much in advance.

As a minority member of Trinity Cathedral, Sacramento, I am grateful for the opportunity to reflect on the stewardship theme and the call to "Walk in Love." My journey to this community began nearly 30 years ago when I immigrated from Sierra Leone in West Africa to pursue a better life for myself and my family.

Since then, I have been blessed to serve in various capacities within my church and broader community. My involvement as an usher, livestream volunteer, lector, vestry chaplain, and Eucharistic minister has been a source of great joy and fulfillment. These roles have allowed me to express my dedication to the Anglican Church, a commitment that has been a central part of my life since childhood. My life's journey has provided me with a unique perspective on the concept of stewardship. As the African proverb goes "It Takes a Village" expresses the notion that success and overcoming obstacles frequently involve the assistance, collaboration, and group effort of others, which was deeply ingrained in my upbringing and highlighted the value of community, cooperation, and teamwork in achieving long-term objectives.

This makes me aware of the value of community, the importance of supporting one another, and the power of love in transcending cultural boundaries. Stewardship, to me, is about more than just financial contributions—it is about giving of oneself, sharing one's talents, and fostering a spirit of love and inclusivity within the community. Matthew 25:14-30 is a parable that teaches about the importance of using one's talents or abilities wisely.

As I reflect on the phrase Walk in Love, I am reminded of the profound impact that love can have when expressed through our actions. Walking in love demonstrates care and concern for others, fosters a sense of belonging, and builds a community rooted in compassion and empathy. Through this lens of love, I approach my stewardship responsibilities, seeking to nurture a community where everyone feels seen, heard, and supported. Together, let us walk in love, embracing our differences and nurturing a community where everyone can thrive and contribute their unique gifts to the greater good. | Together good | Together go
