Service Abroad



One of the last days Teresa and I were in Spain, we made plans to attend an Anglican Church in the heart of Valencia. Most of the congregation was made up of folks from Great Britan and Australia who

had moved to Spain for everything from family and retirement to jobs and calls. The pastor, Julian, greeted us at the door and by our Spanish he knew that we were American right away. We were welcomed, nonetheless. In fact, the congregation was hospitable to a fault – if that is a thing?

The order of service was much the same as ours at St. Luke's and as you would expect, the entire thing was in Spanish, not English. I'll be honest, I could only pick up a word or two here or there in the liturgy. Nevertheless, because the order of the mass was almost identical to ours, I felt like I could really participate despite the service being in a different

language. That was wonderful. When it came time for the peace, we were welcomed yet again and encouraged to partake in the Eucharist. We did. And as I did, I realized just how much I yearned for home, for St. Luke's.

That's the beautiful thing about the Book of Common Prayer, isn't it? You can go almost anywhere in the Anglican Communion and the services, or at least the order of the mass, will be similar. Though the language may be different, it truly is wonderful to know where you are and be present in the service when you are away from home. And while it's comforting, still it makes you miss your community – that's the real experience at least for me.

I hope that as you find yourself abroad perhaps this holiday season or later, you will include church as a part of your travels and avail yourself to community abroad. Perhaps you already do. You can be sure, at any rate, that worshiping abroad provides a perspective one cannot attain unless one


goes. That's for sure.



After the service we were invited out into the courtyard to share coffee and sweets. Some things never change. Julian's wife, Nicky (Think Ann Evans only British) said that one of the ways they are reaching out is by doing things right in their own backyard. It may surprise you, but most of the folks that go there actually commute to church – yet they are making connections one cup of café negra at a time.

Other than Rome, I've never been to a more Catholic city in my life. And, much like the Episcopal Church is in the U.S. the Anglican Church in Valencia is a haven not only for expats but people searching for a home that is loving, protestant, and catholic. I really didn't know what to expect, but I'm glad we went, met other Anglicans, and learned that we really aren't that different after all. Wouldn't you know, the last song came over us like a wave – "It is well with my Soul." Yes, even in Spain.

The Holy Grail in Valencia

Archeological studies, historical documents, the testimony of Tradition, recent discoveries about the design and the inscription in the base, comparative analyses with other similar cups around the world, references from the ancient liturgy, various investigations from distinct scientific disciplines, and even the legends of the Grail all of these indicate it is perfectly plausible that the Holy Chalice of Valencia was in the hands of Jesus Christ at the Last Supper, and that it contained the Most Precious Blood of the Redeemer. In contrast, there is no evidence

that counters this position.

The mystifying beauty of the Holy Chalice is striking, as is the uniform shape, and the resplendent whole of the ensemble, calling visitors to ask themselves if they are truly before the "Precious Chalice" of the Lord.

Only the top portion is the sacred relic: a cup in the form of a carefully shaped and polished bowl. In the light, it reflects various streaks of warm tones. The cup is made of a type of veined sardonyx agate that comes from the region between Alexandria and Syria. Without a doubt, it is a Palestinian artifact, crafted in the first century AD. It is an example of a Jewish "Blessing Cup" for the ritual Paschal Supper in the Hebrew tradition, the most important piece in a Jewish family's treasury.

This Cup, quite familiar to those at the Last Supper, is the one that St. Peter and the Popes (up until Sixtus II) continued to use to celebrate the Eucharist. This is referenced in the ancient Roman Canon of the Mass: "Taking this semi-precious cup (accipiens et hun praeclarum Calle Servein his holy and venerable hands This Canon (or Prayer) was at first reserved to the Bishop of Rome, and is the only one that uses the expression this same" (et hunc), referring to the Chalice of the Lord.

During the persecution' or Valerian (of the year 258) the deacon St. Lawrence sent the cup to his native Huésca, Spain

Then during the Muslim occupation, it was hidden in various places in the Pyrenees until it was brought to the monastery of San Juan de la Peña.

In the 11th century, in order to protect the chalice, the reliquary was attached to it: the base (an inverted cup with a mysterious inscription) and the rest the handles, the pearls, and precious

stones). But the elegant Cup kept its simplicity, without decoration, just as it was in the First Century.

In 1399, the Holy Chalice became part of the Reliquary of the Crown of Aragon. King Afonso the Magnanimous had it brought to his Palace in Valencia and, later, he delivered it to the Cathedral in Valencia (in 1437), where it has been venerated since. It has been taken out of the Cathedral on very few occasions (to save it from wars and persecution, and in thanksgiving visits to the places where it was safeguarded on these occasions.)

Popes St. John Paul II (in 1982) and Benedict XVI (in 2006) celebrated the Eucharist in Valencia with the Chalice, as Jesus did at the Last Supper, and as the Popes did until the 3rd century.

The Holy Chalice has always been venerated as a true and valuable relic of the Passion of Jesus Christ. It has great architectural, historical, artistic and cultural value. But its greatest worth is that it was the Cup that Jesus looked at, and took in his hands, and in which he consecrated his Most Precious Blood. It is a witness of the Eucharist, which gives us Eternal Life.


