

Stewardship Sunday is a day to celebrate all that God has done in our lives, not only as individuals but as a community. As we gather, we'll take time to reflect on the ways God is calling us to walk in love through the ministry of this church, offer our pledge cards, and celebrate Eucharist together. For we are, after all, a church family that celebrates God's richness, life, and each other... one that tends to the lonely, and welcomes everyone with arms wide open. Be assured that your gifts—of time, talent, and treasure—make all of this possible and keep us growing and walking together in faith.

After our service, we'll continue the celebration with a delicious lunch in the Metcalf Hall, a chance to share in fellowship, laughter, and conversation. Whether you're new to St. Luke's or have been a part of this family for years, I encourage you to stay and enjoy this time together. Stewardship is as much about relationships as it is about resources; in fact, it's through our shared relationships that we see God's love most clearly.

So, mark your calendars, remember to set your clocks back, bring your families, and join us on this special Sunday. Let's walk in love, step by step, grateful for each other and for the journey we share. I look forward to seeing each of you as we celebrate our shared blessings and consider how God is calling us to steward those blessings with joy and faith.

Theologians Corner:



Allhallowtide

As we approach the end of October, we enter a deeply significant time in the church calendar known as Allhallowtide, a season dedicated to remembrance, reflection, and gratitude for the lives of those who have gone before us in faith. This season encompasses three days: All Hallows' Eve on October 31, All Saints' Day on November 1, and All Souls' Day on November 2. Each day has its own unique meaning and traditions, inviting us to honor the communion of saints and deepen our connection with the wider family of God.

Most of us are familiar with Halloween, or All Hallows' Eve, as it is commonly celebrated today. However, its roots run far deeper than costumes and candy. Historically, the evening before All Saints' Day was a time for Christians to prepare spiritually by recalling the power of God's light over darkness. It was a night of vigil, prayer, and reflection, particularly in honoring the saints who shone as beacons of faith

throughout history. Early traditions included lighting candles, ringing bells to remember the dead, and engaging in prayer for the faithful departed.

As the world around us celebrates Halloween with secular festivities, we might take a moment to pause and remember that we, too, are part of the same communion of saints. One simple practice to honor All Hallows' Eve is to light a candle in memory of those we love who have passed and say a prayer of thanksgiving for their lives. Some families find meaning in carving a cross or other Christian symbols into pumpkins as a reminder that Christ's light always prevails.

The next day, November 1, marks All Saints' Day, a principal feast day in our church. This day is set aside to honor all saints, known and unknown, who have lived lives of exceptional faith, courage, and love for God. Saints are examples of holiness who inspire us to pursue our faith journey with

dedication and humility. Many of them endured great hardships, and through their lives, we see the power of God's grace to transform and strengthen.

The Episcopal Church traditionally celebrates All Saints' Day with a special Eucharist, during which we remember these heroes of the faith, asking for their intercession and seeking to follow their example. Some parishes also display icons or portraits of saints, providing a visual reminder of the "great cloud of witnesses" who encourage us in our walk with Christ (Hebrews 12:1). It is also common to renew our baptismal vows on this day, affirming our commitment to live as disciples of Christ, as did the saints before us.

On All Souls' Day, the focus shifts from the canonized saints to all who have departed from this life, particularly those who may not have been recognized officially as saints but who are beloved members of our families and communities. This day is sometimes called the Commemoration of All Faithful Departed, a day to remember those we have lost, lift them up in prayer, and thank God for the lives they lived.

All Souls' Day provides us with an opportunity to express our love for those who have gone before us and affirm our hope in the resurrection. Many churches observe this day with a requiem mass or prayer service such as St. John's in Tulsa. Some congregations invite parishioners to write down the names of their departed loved ones and place them on the altar, lifting them in prayer together as a community. Lighting a candle at home and saying a prayer for departed loved ones is another meaningful way to honor this day.

Together, these three days invite us to reflect on the full communion of saints—those who lived extraordinary lives of faith and those closer to home who quietly inspired us by their love and dedication. During Allhallowtide, we honor our place in a vast family, stretching across time and space, united in Christ's love.
