Friends in Christ,

Grace and peace to you as we prepare to enter the sacred season of Lent. Lent, as you are well aware of, is a time of reflection, repentance, and renewal—a journey that calls us to walk with Christ toward the cross and, ultimately, the joy of resurrection. As we prepare for these forty days, I invite you to engage in the practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, deepening your relationship with God, and with one another in holy fellowship

Below, you will find opportunities to gather as a community for worship, fellowship, and devotion throughout this holy season.

Shrove Tuesday – March 4th, 2025

Before we begin our Lenten fast, join us for the Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper from 5:30-6:30 p.m. in Metcalf Hall. This traditional meal is a time of joy and fellowship as we prepare for the solemnity of Ash Wednesday. Consider staying afterward as we will burn the palms from years past to make the ashes for Ash Wednesday.

Ash Wednesday – March 5th, 2025

We begin Lent with the solemn Imposition of Ashes followed by Holy Eucharist - a reminder of both our mortality and need for repentance but also the promise that awaits us as the adopted heirs of Christ. Services will be held at:

12:15 p.m. in the Nave

2:00 p.m. Green Country Village

6:00 p.m. in the Nave

Our Lenten Devotional this Year will be "The Poetry of Lent"

Throughout Lent, we will be engaging in a congregational devotional study using the pamphlet entitled "The Poetry of Lent." The devotional is free. Nevertheless, I do whole heartedly suggest purchasing a copy of Mary Oliver's book of poems entitled "Devotions." Copies of The Poetry of Lent will be available in the narthex on Shrove Tuesday.

Midweek Manna – Wednesdays in Lent

Each Wednesday, join us for Midweek Manna, a simple soup supper followed by a sung Vespers service with a brief homily in the Nave. We will gather for supper at 6

p.m. in Metcalf Hall and then adjourn to the Nave for service afterwards. I will be in Texas for continuing education on Wednesday, March 12th, but not to worry, the service shall go on!

Stations of the Cross – Fridays in Lent

Please consider praying the Stations of the Cross at St. Luke's every Friday this Lent at 6 p.m. in the Nave.

Holy Week and the Paschal Triduum:

As we approach Holy Week, we near the Paschal Triduum, the most sacred three days of the Christian year:

Palm Sunday - April 13th, 2025

The Sunday of the Passion begins Holy Week and features readings from the Gospel according to Luke this year.

Holy Monday – April 14th, 2025

Includes Clergy Renewal of Vows and the Chrism Mass at St. Paul's Cathedral in OKC.

Maundy Thursday – April 17th, 2025 (The Beginning of the Triduum)

We remember the Last Supper and Jesus' command to love one another. This solemn service, including the washing of feet and the stripping of the altar, will be at 6 p.m.

All Night Vigil - April 17th to April 18th, 2025

Consider taking an hour to pray at the altar of repose located in the chapel throughout the night.

Good Friday - April 18th, 2025

We gather at the foot of the cross to remember Christ's passion and death. The Good Friday Liturgy will be at 12:15 p.m. in the Nave.

Holy Saturday – April 19th, 2025

A brief Holy Saturday service at 9 a.m. invites us to wait patiently at the tomb.

The Great Vigil of Easter - April 19th, 2025

This most ancient and powerful service of the church year begins in darkness and moves into the light of resurrection. Join us at 6 p.m. for the first celebration of Easter, including the lighting of the Paschal candle, the reading of salvation history, and the first joyful "Alleluia" of Easter.


Easter Sunday – April 20th, 2025

## Theologians Corner:

# George Herbert Priest and Poet

I am partial to poets. Priests are okay... most of the time.

George Herbert was born in 1593, a cousin of the Earl of Pembroke. His mother was a friend of the poet John Donne. George attended Trinity College, Cambridge, and became the Public Orator of the University, responsible for giving speeches of welcome in Latin to famous visitors, and writing letters of thanks, also in Latin, to acknowledge gifts of books for the University Library. This brought him to the attention of King James I, who granted him an annual allowance, and seemed likely to

make him an ambassador. However, in 1625 the king died, and George Herbert, who had originally gone to college with the intention of becoming a priest, but had his head turned by the prospect of a career at Court, determined anew to seek ordination. In 1626 he was ordained, and became vicar and then rector of the parish of Bemerton and neighboring Fugglestone, not far from Salisbury.

He served faithfully as a parish priest, diligently visiting his parishioners and bringing them the sacraments when they were ill, and food and clothing when they were in want. He read Morning and Evening Prayer daily in the church, encouraging the congregation to join him when possible, and ringing the church bell before each service so that those who could not come might hear it and pause in their work to join their prayers with his. He used to go once a week to Salisbury to hear Evening Prayer sung there in the cathedral. On one occasion he was late because he had met a man whose horse had fallen with a heavy load, and he stopped, took off his coat, and helped the man to unload the cart, get the horse back on its feet, and then reload the cart. His spontaneous generosity and good will won him the affection of his parishioners.

Today, however, he is remembered chiefly for his book of poems, The Temple, which he sent shortly before his death to his friend Nicholas Ferrar, to publish if he thought them suitable. They were published after Herbert's death, and have influenced the style of other poets, including Samuel Taylor Coleridge. Several of them have been used as hymns, in particular "Teach me, my God and King," and "Let all the world in every corner sing." Another of his poems contains the lines:

Prayer, the Church's banquet, Angel's age, God's breath in man returning to his birth, The soul in paraphrase, the heart in pilgrimage, The Christian plummet sounding heav'n and earth.

Still another:

#### LOVE III

Love bade me welcome: yet my soul drew back, guilty of dust and sin. But quicked-ey'd Love, Observing me grow slack from my first entrance in, Drew near to me, sweetly questioning, if I lack'd any thing.

A guest, I answer'd, worthy to be here:

Love said, You should be he. I the unkinde, engrateful? ah my deare, I can not look on thee. Love took my hand, and smiling did reply, Who made the eyes but I?

Truth Lord, but I hav marr'd them: let my shame go where it doth deserve. And know you not, sayes Love, who bore the blame? My deare, then I will serve. You must sit down, sayes love, and taste my meat:

So I did sit and eat.

Glory to God on High And on earth Peace good will toward man.

Together we pray: Almighty God, who didst call thy servant George Herbert from the pursuit of worldly honors to be a poet and a pastor of soulst: Give us grace, we pray, joyfully to dedicate all our powers to thy service; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.



## News from Roger and Joanne Green in Thailand



Hi friends,



Thank you for praying for the recent Marriage Retreat with two Thai couples. As we focused on Song of Songs chapters

5 to 8 as compared to the first four chapters, we could see an expansion of the journey of love. Chapters 5 and 6 record the "hiccup" in the relationship and how each party handled it--from the inviting but non-pressuring stance of the husband, the woman's desire to pursue, the friends' encouragement to remember what was good about the husband, the husband's affirmation of his wife and then reconciliation. Chapters 7 and 8 seem to describe a mature love, especially with the declarations in Song of Songs 8:6-7:

Place me like a seal over your heart,
like a seal on your arm;
for love is as strong as death,
its jealousy unyielding as the grave.
It burns like a blazing fire,
like a mighty flame.
Many waters cannot quench love;
rivers cannot wash it away.
If one were to give
all the wealth of his house for love,
it would be utterly scorned.

As part of the activities of the retreat, we also reflected on the account of the daughters of Zelophehad (Numbers 27:1-11 and Numbers 36:1-12) for a description of healthy, open communication between people and with God, showing how relationships can adjust and be resilient.

In addition, we practiced some listening exercises as described by the online version of The Marriage Course from HTB Church, London. Our conclusion was that Song of Songs is helpful for putting in place the mindset, but it's not a how-to manual. Marriage courses are usually helpful for understanding the how-to's of marriage, but they will be augmented if they can build on having a prior mindset from Song of Songs.

One of the beauties of Song of Songs is that the poetry works for both a husband/wife relationship on earth and for an individual's relationship with God. I once talked about Song of Songs with a mature Thai Christian single woman, and she easily related Song of Songs to her relationship with God. When seen through the poetry of Song of Songs, she had no glitch in her understanding of how beautiful our relationship is as the Church with our Savior Jesus. She could readily see (on her own and without any prompting from me) how a husband and wife relationship can be a picture of the joy we have with Jesus.

Thank you also for praying for the last mother and daughter session, which was held last month (January). For this last mother and daughter session, the Thai mothers and daughters made plans together. They had discussed Bible concepts from one session to the next. They were ready to think through what they wanted to commit to. Praise God for this investment in the lives of these four mothers and their daughters. From the story of Naomi and Ruth to the spiritual reality of the Tabernacle to Ephesians 5:22-33 to 1 Corinthians 7 to Genesis 2:24 to Song of Songs 2 to the blessings in Ruth 4:11-17, the journey shows how important it is for mothers and daughters to build unity now and to be ready to be blessed by God and by the community, whether single or married.

Thank you for praying for us. It's been a lot of effort for these two endeavors, but we thank God for His provision and see much fruit from the investment.

For prayer, our first request for prayer is for my dad, who had a stroke last week. Please ask God to heal him from the effects of the stroke.

In addition, attached is a photo of Fai with her husband Ohm. Fai is a poet. In addition to the ability to analyze literature, she has abilities in writing curriculum and managing events. She has been inspired by the Song of Songs retreats. We told the group that it was our last time to lead a Song of Songs retreat for Thai Christians. Now it's time for Thai Christians to lead. We can help them, but we should not lead any more. Now it is up to the Lord for what opportunities He will open up for them. Our second request for prayer is to ask God to build up Fai and Ohm so that they, in turn, will become a big blessing for many others.

Some thoughts from Fai after the retreat: "Song of Songs is not only love between spouses but also GOD's purpose for my own Christian life. . .The journey of love is a long journey and beyond (the) 'happy ending' in chapters 1 to 4. . .There is a hidden question for the journey of love. The question is 'How do we love each other more?'. . .If we spend time pondering over this poetry, we will meet the great 'guidance to living life with great love.'. . .It's an impressive picture. . .I had asked and prayed to GOD. . .'Please tell me about how to love you more' and 'What is the Christian life?' After that God led me to the 'Song of Songs.'

Ladies, if you are looking for a special way to "give to" for Lent this year, join us at 11:30 Mondays for Ladies Prayer Partners. We have recently passed our one year anniversary of praying together each week from the beautiful prayers in our *Book of Comon Prayer*. We are finished by noon for those who have a schedule to keep; otherwise, there is time after prayer for catching up with the happenings in each other's lives or going out to lunch. Think of this group as a type of prayer support group for the church and our congregation. 
