"Always we begin again!"

It's hard to believe that summer is beginning to wind down and the program year is nearly upon us! In the life of the Church, the "program year" refers to that season of our life together, typically beginning in mid-August, when we resume the full rhythm of our shared life in faith forums, choir rehearsals, Wednesday night programs, outreach events, small groups, and all the wonderful ministries that make St. Luke's a vibrant community of faith.

Here, the program year is more than just a return to routine, right? It's a time when we recommit ourselves to growing as disciples of Jesus. Whether that means joining a Bible study, volunteering with youth, singing in the choir, serving in worship on Sunday morning or during the week, this season offers each of us a chance to go deeper in faith and in fellowship.

The phrase "Always we begin again" mentioned above is one I love. It is attributed to St. Benedict of Nursia, the 6th-century monk who wrote the Rule of St. Benedict, a guide for monastic life that continues to shape Christian spirituality today. While the exact phrase doesn't appear verbatim in the Rule, its spirit is deeply woven throughout Benedict's teachings and is something fundamental to the pattern of our life together too.

To "always begin again" is to recognize that our spiritual life is a lifelong journey, not a one-time accomplishment. It reflects the understanding that God's mercy is constant, and every day offers a new opportunity to return to the sacred path. Spirituality, stability (remaining committed to a particular community and practice), and conversion of life (a continual turning toward God) all go hand in hand here. And so, "Always begin again" is a call to us for not only yearly renewal but daily renewal, to not give up when we fall short, and to return with grace and trust to our commitments.

As we step into this new program year, may we do so with gratitude, anticipation, and a renewed sense of purpose friends. Surely the Holy Spirit is at work here among us. Let's show up for one another, and for the work God is calling us to do in Bartlesville and beyond.



Theologian's Corner: The Transfiguration

This week we commemorate the moment in time when Christ, as He was beginning to teach His disciples that He must die and rise again, revealed Himself in shining splendor to Peter, James, and John. Moses and Elijah were present and are taken to signify that the Law and the Prophets testify that Jesus is the promised Messiah. God the Father also proclaimed him as such, saying, "This is my Beloved Son. Listen to him." For a moment the veil is drawn aside, and men still on earth are permitted a glimpse of the heavenly reality, the glory of the Eternal Triune God.

In the East, the Festival of the Transfiguration has been celebrated since the late fourth century and is one of the twelve great festivals of the East Orthodox calendar.

In the West it was observed after the ninth century by some monastic orders, and in 1457 Pope Callistus III ordered its general observance. At the time of the Reformation, it was still felt in some countries to be a "recent innovation," and so was not immediately observed. Now, however, the day is found on most calendars.

A recent tendency in the West is to commemorate the Transfiguration on the Sunday just before Lent, in accordance with the pattern found in the Synoptics, where Jesus is beginning to speak of his forthcoming death just about the time of the Transfiguration, so that it forms a fitting transition between the Epiphany season, in which Christ makes himself known, and the Lenten season, in which he prepares the disciples for what lies ahead. That may be the case, however, the Feast of the Transfiguration is for us traditionally held on August 6th.
