How We Do Theology

When most people hear the word theology, they imagine professors in ivory towers or dusty books written in languages that are long forgotten. Yet, in the Episcopal Church, theology is not just the work of scholars. Theology, quite literally, is "faith seeking understanding." That faith, of course, is in us! Thus, theology is the way we as the Body of Christ make sense of who God is, who we are, and how we are called to live in the world. And, it is something the whole Church does together.

Each Sunday when we gather, we are practicing theology. The prayers, hymns, and readings are not just words on a page; they shape what we believe about God and about ourselves. The liturgy is our "common work," and it teaches us that God is Creator, Christ is Redeemer, and the Spirit is alive in our midst. Every "Amen" you speak is part of the Church doing theology together.

Theology also happens in our small groups, Bible studies, in the new discussion group, the Spiritual Discovery Group - in Faith Forum, Y.D., Choir, etc. When we ask questions, wrestle with Scripture, or share how God is moving in our lives, we are practicing theology. We are not trying to win arguments or prove points, but to deepen our understanding of God's grace and our call to live faithfully in response to that profound love.

Theology is not only about words and ideas it shapes our practices as Christians. When the vestry discerns how best to use resources, when the altar guild prepares the sacred space, when Y.D. serves in the community, each group is doing theology. They are asking, in their own way: How does God's love shape what we do? How do we respond to that love?

So, theology is not the task of a select few. It is the shared work of everyone at St. Luke's...as we pray, sing, study, discuss, worship, and serve. Each of us has a part in seeking understanding and living out the good news of Jesus Christ. I encourage you wholeheartedly to continue to be

theologians together, listening for God's voice and discovering how our lives bear witness to the love of Christ in Bartlesville and beyond.



Theologian's Corner Albert Schweitzer

Albert Schweitzer, theologian, philosopher, organist, authority on Bach, physician, and missionary, was born in 1875, as the son of a Lutheran pastor, in Alsace.

He studied at Strasbourg and at Paris, and around 1900 Schweitzer became a doctor of philosophy and a doctor of theology, and was ordained to the Lutheran ministry and became a preacher and a lecturer in philosophy! As mentioned above, was an outstanding organist, and in 1905 published a study of Johann Sebastian Bach while simultaneously writing a book called The Quest of the Historical Jesus! (What an underachiever.)

In 1905 Schweitzer announced his intention of becoming a missionary doctor, and resigned his positions, giving up a brilliant career, to go to medical school. In 1913 he and his wife set out for Lambarene in Gabon where they built a hospital. His work there was interrupted by World War I.

Since Schweitzer was a German citizen, he was interned by the French and spent his prison time writing. He published his Philosophy of Civilization, in which he urged "reverence for life," a philosophy of compassion for all living things.

A visitor to Lambarene saw a mosquito on his arm once and was about to swat it. Schweitzer saw it and said: "Think twice. Remember that you are a guest in its country."

After the war, Schweitzer returned to Lambarene and rebuilt his hospital, adding a leper colony. His autobiography, Out of My Life and Thought, was published in 1933. And, in 1952 he received the Nobel Peace Prize.

One of the best books I've read about Schweitzer is from one of his colleagues from Lambarene entitled: In Africa with Schweitzer by Edgar Berman.

Schweitzer died on the 4th of September in 1965.

Together we pray: O God, who didst endow thy servant Albert Schweitzer with a multitude of gifts for learning, beauty, and service: Inspire thy Church that we, following his example, may be utterly dedicated to thee that all our works might be done to thy glory and the welfare of thy people; through Christ our Lord who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, One God, now and forever. Amen.
