The Rev. Nancy Gill Named Dean of the Northeast Deanery



In thanksgiving I want to share the news that the Rev. Nancy Gill of Claremore has been elected to serve as Dean of the Northeast Deanery of the Diocese of Oklahoma. Nancy is a dedicated priest and a thoughtful leader. Her election reflects not only her own faithfulness but also the vitality of congregations here in northeastern Oklahoma.

You'll recall that the Diocese of Oklahoma is made up of congregations that stretch from the plains of the Panhandle to the rolling hills of Green Country. To make our shared work more manageable, the diocese is divided into several deaneries, which are geographical groupings of

parishes and missions. Each deanery has its own council, made up of clergy and lay representatives from each congregation, and together they are supposed to help strengthen communication and cooperation across our common life.

In this system, the Dean serves as a connector, linking the bishop and diocesan staff with local congregations. The Dean helps organize meetings, facilitates conversation among clergy and lay leaders, and supports parishes in times of transition or renewal. The Dean is also a pastoral presence to other clergy, helping to foster collegiality and shared purpose.

The Northeast Deanery includes congregations in Claremore, Bartlesville, Pryor, Miami, Vinita, and the surrounding areas. Though each parish is unique, together we form a network of mutual support and mission, bound by our shared identity as Episcopalians in this corner of the diocese.

But our deanery is not simply just a bureaucratic layer. The deanery is a vital expression of our life together. Deanery gatherings give clergy and lay leaders a chance to exchange ideas, plan joint ministries, and strengthen the bonds of friendship across parish lines. They provide a space for collaboration in outreach, youth ministry, and formation, as well as a forum for prayer and discernment.

The deanery also plays an important role in preparing for Diocesan Convention, the annual gathering where clergy and lay delegates from across the state meet to worship, elect diocesan leaders, and discern the direction of our common life. Before convention, the deanery helps to review resolutions, nominate delegates, and ensure that every parish has a voice in the wider Church's governance.

In that sense, the deanery is where diocesan life becomes local, where large-scale decisions meet the needs and hopes of real congregations and communities.

Please keep Nancy in your prayers as she begins this ministry, and continue to pray for our bishop, diocesan staff, and all who serve the Church across Oklahoma. May this new season of leadership be one marked by renewed collaboration, open communication, and joyful service in Christ's name.

Theologian's Corner: St. Luke The Evangelist Our Patron (October 18th)

Almost all that we know about Luke comes from the New Testament. He was a physician (Col 4:14), a companion of Paul on some of his missionary journeys (Acts 16:10; 20:5; 27-28). Material found in his Gospel and not elsewhere includes much of the account of Our Lord's birth and infancy and boyhood, some of the most moving parables, such as that of the Good Samaritan and that of the Prodigal Son, and three of the sayings of Christ on the Cross: "Father, forgive them," "Thou shalt be with me in Paradise," and "Father, into thy hands I commend my spirit."

In Luke's account of the Gospel, we find an emphasis on the human love of Christ, on His compassion for sinners and for suffering and unhappy persons, for outcasts such as the Samaritans, tax collectors, lepers, shepherds (not a respected profession), and for the poor. The role of women in Christ's ministry is more emphasized in Luke than in the other Gospel writings.

In the book of Acts, we find the early Christian community poised from the start to carry out its commission, confident and aware of Divine guidance. We see how the early Christians at first preached only to Jews, then to Samaritans, then to outright Gentiles like Cornelius, and finally

explicitly recognized that Gentiles and Jews are called on equal terms to the service and fellowship of Christ.

Luke is commonly thought to be the only non-Jewish New Testament writer. His writings place the life of Christ and the development of the early Church in the larger context of the Roman Empire and society. On the other hand, his writings are focused on Jerusalem and on the Temple. His Gospel begins and ends in the Temple, and chapters nine through nineteen portray Jesus as journeying from Galilee to Jerusalem. Similarly, the Book of Acts describes the Church in Jerusalem (and worshipping in the Temple) and then describes the missionary journeys of Paul as excursions from and returns to Jerusalem. Luke is a sweeping epic!

Together let us pray: Almighty God, who didst inspire thy servant Luke the physician to set forth in the Gospel the love and healing power of thy Son: Graciously continue in thy Church the like love and power to heal, to the praise and glory of thy Name; through the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

And numerous committee meetings for cares of the church.


October 5th he will start his 3 month Field assignment at Espiritu Santo Episcopal Church in Tulsa.
