## Theologians Corner: Andrei Rublev

### Monk and Iconographer, 1430

Andrei Rublev, born in the 1360s, died between 1427 and 1430, is considered to be the greatest medieval Russian painter of Orthodox icons and frescoes.

There is little information about his life. It is not known where he was born. Andrei Rublev probably lived in the Trinity-St. Sergius Lavra monastery near Moscow.

The first mention of Rublev is in 1405 when he decorated icons and frescos for the Cathedral of the Annunciation of the Moscow Kremlin in company with Theophanes the Greek and Prokhor of Gorodets. His name was the last of the list of masters as the junior both by rank and by age. Theophanes was an important Byzantine

master who moved to Russia, and is considered to have trained Rublev.

Chronicles tell us that in 1408 he painted (together with Daniil Cherni) the Assumption Cathedral in Vladimir and in 1425–1427 the Cathedral of St. Trinity in the Trinity-St. Sergius Lavra. After Daniil's death Andrei came to Moscow's Andronikov Monastery where he painted his last work, the frescoes of the Savior Cathedral.

He is also believed to have painted at least one of the miniatures in the Khitrovo Gospels.

The only work authenticated as entirely his is the icon of the Trinity, ca. 1410, currently in the Tretyakov Gallery, Moscow. It is based upon an earlier icon known as the "Hospitality of Abraham" (illustrating Genesis 18). Rublev removed the figures of Abraham and Sarah from the scene, and through a subtle use of composition and symbolism changed the subject to focus on the Mystery of the Trinity.

In Rublev's art, two traditions are combined: the highest asceticism and the classic harmony of Byzantine mannerism. The characters of his paintings are always peaceful and calm. After some time his art came to be perceived as the ideal of Church painting and of Orthodox iconography.

Andrei died at Andronikov Monastery on between 1427 and 1430 (the traditional date is January 29, 1430). He was canonized a saint in 1988 by the Russian Orthodox Church. The church celebrates his feast day on January 29 and July 4.

Since 1959 the Andrei Rublev Museum has been open at the Andronnikov Monastery, displaying the art of his works and his epoch.

Together we pray: Holy God, we bless you for the gift of your monk and icon writer Andrei Rublev, who, inspired by the Holy Spirit, provided a window into heaven for generations to come, revealing the majesty and mystery of the holy and blessed Trinity; who lives and reigns through ages of ages. Amen.

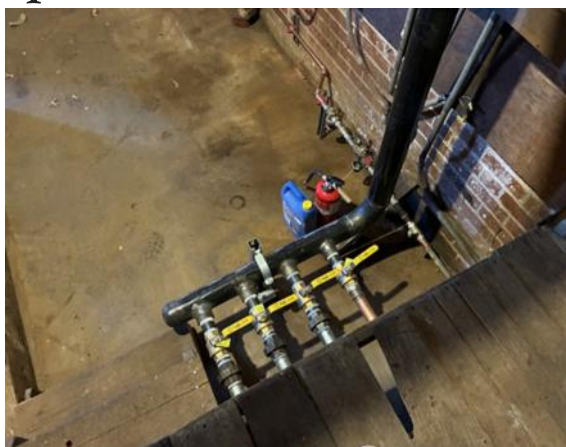
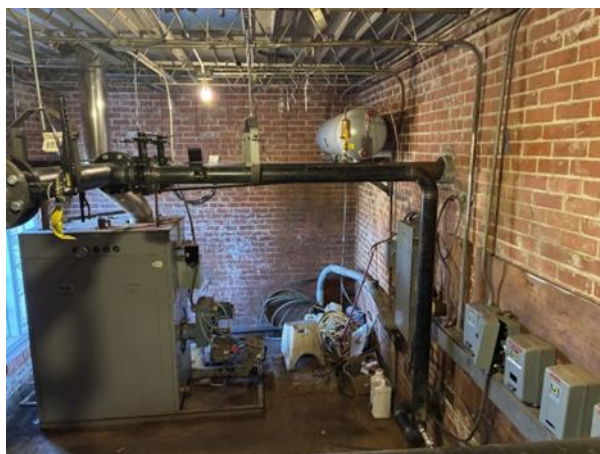


# ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

## **Sunday, February 1, 2026**

Last year St. Luke's Fellowship announced the start of Forks & Fellowship, an opportunity to share a meal with others in our church family in an informal and relaxed setting. In 2025, sixteen single adults and married couples of all ages were put into 4 groups that shared stories and developed deeper friendships in small dinner groups that met at least four times throughout the year. Most of these same people are signing up for 2026 and will be put into new groups that will include church members that are up for the challenge! Wanting new people to join in on this fun way to get together and that is where you sign up.

The Fellowship team creates small groups of no more than eight people per group and assigns a leader for each group. Then it's up to your group to schedule dinners or activities to get to know each of your members. You can have dinner at your home, you can go to brunch after church or choose to meet at a local restaurant/coffee shop/gathering place. The purpose of this fellowship opportunity is to develop relationships with folks of all ages in the church. These times can foster opportunities to make friends outside of our usual social circles, getting to know new people in our church family.

If you are interested, you can register on-line ([click here to register](#)) or drop by the office. Answer a few basic questions by Sunday, February 22. Groups will be notified in early March, and each group will plan their own schedule to meet at least 4 times during the year.

### ***What is Forks and Fellowship?***

Forks and Fellowship is an opportunity to share a meal with others in our church family in an informal and relaxed setting, either in restaurants or homes. It's great for newcomers and long-timers! This is not a bible study group but another way to fellowship with those within the church.

### ***What are we eating?***

When we say "meal," we mean just about anything – coffee before/after work, dinner, dessert on Friday nights, lunch after church on Sunday, etc. Part of how groups will be put together is based

on your input on preferred days/times. This is about fellowship and not how fancy a spread you can create.

### *Where are we eating?*

Again, it's up to your group! You can rotate hosting in homes, meet at coffee shops, eat at restaurants, get takeout and meet at the park, etc.! Even meeting at the church for pizza and salad is an option if arrangements are made with the church office.

### *What's the agenda?*

The only agenda is to get to know one another better and share food and fellowship. There is no program – just a meal, hospitality, and conversation.

### *Who can participate?*

Everyone! Couples, singles, and families are all invited to participate. Anyone can be part of a group, and our sign up is designed to help put you in just the right spot. This will be an adults-only fellowship activity as alcohol may be served.

### *How does it work?*

Everyone is assigned to a group of up to 8 other adults. The goal is for each group to get together quarterly, as schedules permit.

### *Who figures out when and where our group will gather?*

When you sign up, there is a place to indicate which days work best for you. There is also a place to indicate if you are willing to help organize the first meeting. This person will gently encourage the host to organize dinner/activity, if needed. There are some online sites, such as [Perfect Potluck](#) or [5 ingredients 15 minutes](#), which might be helpful tools for those looking for ideas for dinners.

### *How are the groups organized? Can I choose my group?*

Your registration information will be used to help us create groups to consistently get a good mix of people. Because we want everyone to make some new friendships and connections, we will place people in groups intentionally, rather than having you select your own group members.

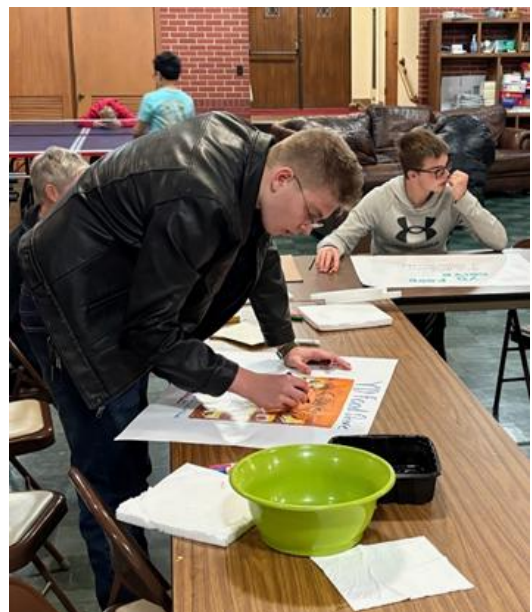

## Souper Bowl Challenge

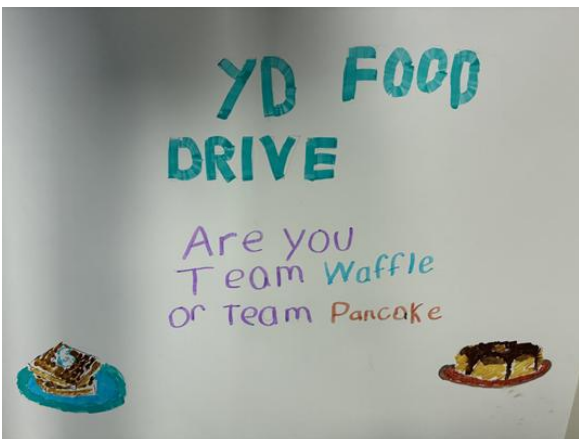
