*From Vestry and Stewardship Committee member, **Lisa Beeman:***

It is from a song in the Broadway show *Rent* that I know there are 525,600 minutes in a year. It is a beautiful song. Those of you who know it, probably have it in your head right now. The song asks how we measure a year in our life. As we often do at each year end, the song contemplates evaluating the year by the things that happened to us, both good and bad. But the song concludes that the answer is love; more specifically, Seasons of Love (which also happens to be the name of the song). Further words from the song: "You know that love is a gift from up above. Share love, give love, spread your love. Measure your life in love." Each year we are given "525,600 moments so dear" by which our lives can be measured. That is no small undertaking.

In our liturgical life, we measure six seasons in the year that teach and remind us of the life of Christ and of the saints. I believe that Jesus would agree that all of our liturgical seasons can be viewed as seasons of love. In Matthew, Jesus teaches us that there are two great commandments that comprise the moral core of the Bible. The 2nd commandment teaches us that true love for God is shown through how a person treats and cares for others, especially the least among us. That's a tough calling: making a conscientious effort to care about others as much as or more than we care about ourselves. This is where the rubber meets the road. It is about actions, not words. I fall short of that commandment more than I care to admit, especially in these difficult times

where more love, more connection, more peace, more kindness, and more forgiveness is needed. Where we are confronted with division more than unity. By this commandment, I believe that Jesus would approve of the concept of measuring a life in love. My strength to better fulfill this commandment comes from a large dose of grace and mercy, the blessing of the Holy Communion, and the all-inclusive love that I find at St. Luke's.

There is another song, a traditional African American gospel song, called Plenty Good Room. It tells of the abundance of space to welcome others into God's kingdom, encouraging believers to choose a seat and sit down. The song reminds us that there is always room in God's house for ourselves and others we invite to join us. Plenty Good Room is the theme of our stewardship campaign this year. Theological stewardship recognizes the foundational Christian belief that everything comes from God and that we, as trustees, are to use the resources we are given to serve others and honor God. Our responsibility for stewardship of St. Luke's is essential in everything we do, and in every liturgical season. It encourages us to connect gratitude with generosity, to share the blessings that God has given each of us, including our skills, talents, interests, and time, by loving and serving others. The continued and growing ministries and missions of St. Luke's make it possible for us to be a people who make room – for our neighbors, strangers, and future generations, the vulnerable, marginalized, and poor, and even those who trespass against us – at God's ever-expanding table, where all are treated equally and all are fed. This way of being, this way of discipleship, this spirit of fellowship, generosity and compassion is living into God's call for us to love. Let us strive to measure the next year, those 525,600 moments so dear, in our own lives and in the collective life of St. Luke's in love.

Theologian's Corner: Philander Chase Presiding Bishop 1852

Born the youngest of fifteen children on December 14th, 1775, in Cornish, New Hampshire, Philander Chase attended Dartmouth College, where he prepared to become a Congregationalist minister. While at Dartmouth, he happened upon a copy of the Book of Common Prayer. Next to the Bible, he thought it was the most excellent book he had ever studied, and believed that it was surely inspired by God. At the age of nineteen he was confirmed in the Episcopal Church.

Following his graduation from Dartmouth, Chase worked as a schoolteacher in Albany, New York, and read for Holy Orders. Ordained as a deacon in 1798, he began mission work on the northern and western frontiers among the pioneers and the Mohawk and Oneida peoples. The first of the many congregations he founded was at Lake George in New York State.

Ordained as a priest in 1799, at the age of twenty-three, Chase served as rector of Christ Church, Poughkeepsie, New York until 1805. He then moved to New Orleans, where he organized the first Protestant congregation in Louisiana. That parish now serves as the cathedral church for the Diocese of Louisiana. In 1810, he returned north to Hartford, Connecticut, where he served for six years as rector of Christ Church, now the cathedral church of the Diocese of Connecticut. In 1817, he accepted a call to be the first rector of St. John's Church in Worthington, Ohio. A year later he was elected the first Bishop of Ohio. He immediately began founding congregations and organizing the diocese. He also established Kenyon College and Bexley Hall Seminary.

In 1831, Chase resigned as Bishop of Ohio and began ministering to Episcopalians and the unchurched in southern Michigan. In 1835, he was elected the first Bishop of Illinois and served in this office until he died on September 20, 1852. During his time in Illinois, he founded numerous congregations, together with Jubilee College, which included a seminary. As the senior bishop in the Episcopal Church, he served as the Presiding Bishop from 1843 until his death.

Almighty God, whose Son Jesus Christ is the pioneer and perfecter of our faith: Grant that like your servant Philander Chase we might have the grace to minister in Christ's name in every place, led by bold witnesses to the Gospel of the Prince of Peace, Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.
